truck bomb destroyed their headquarters near the Beirut airport. Mondale has often pointed to events in Lebanon as an example of Reagan's failure as a leader.

Reagan also accused Mondale of cowering to special interest groups.

"If his campaign were a Broadway play, it would be called 'Promises, Promises,'" Reagan said. Mondale will have to "break his promises or break the bank."

Addressing a mostly college-age audience, Reagan painted a bright picture of the future, say-

ing he wanted to build an America where they could make their "dreams come true."

"America's best days are yet to come," he said. "You ain't seen nothing yet."

Though prominent Oregon Republicans such as Gov. Vic Atiyeh and U.S. Sen. Bob Packwood attended the rally, most Portlanders never got a glimpse of the president.

After a stop in Medford on Monday, Reagan flew into Portland and was whisked to the Benton Hotel, where he spent the night. Students, faculty and staff of the Catholic university were offered 1,500 tickets to the rally, but the rest went to party faithful.

About 20 members of the University's chapter of the College Republicans attended, including journalism major Lori Armstrong, who said she was shocked by the behavior of the hecklers.

"I don't understand how any American, no matter what political party, can yell at the

president like that," Armstrong added.

George Pash, who distributed anti-Reagan literature out-

side the auditorium after the rally, said he also "totally disagreed" with the hecklers.

"I believe if everyone came to heckle, nothing really would get said," Pash said. "Listening is the key to learning."

Probably most who came to the rally experienced no political conversion, but Reagan convinced University of Portland senior Dan Dugan that he should get his vote.

Dugan, a member of the university's wind ensemble that performed at the rally, said he was convinced by the president's sense of humor and the way he

dealt with people.

"Since he made a special effort to come here, I should make a special effort to vote for him," he said.

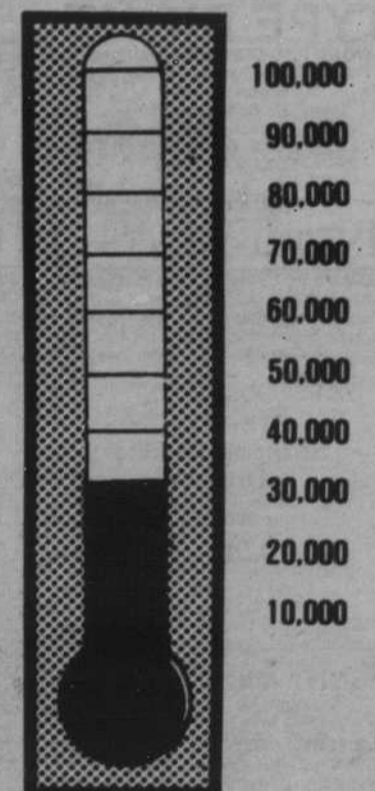
