

Survival seen in Civil War encounter

On the eve of the Civil War clash in Corvallis, the Oregon men's basketball team knows Wednesday's game means much more than the usual claim for state supremacy. The Oregon State match-up is a definite fight — for the Ducks' survival in the 1985 Pac-10 basketball chase.

Oregon is 0-2 in the league, and the chances of picking up a win in Corvallis are like someone hoping for a Chicago-Pittsburgh match-up in Super Bowl XIX. The Bears and Steelers aren't playing in Palo Alto on Jan. 20, but Oregon is playing in Gill Coliseum — a place where the

to-swallow losses for Monson. The Trojan game would have surely been an Oregon win on any other night except USC shot the lights out of the basket in the second half for a 63-59 victory.

In loss number two, UCLA stormed back from a 22-4 deficit to overhaul the Ducks in a double-overtime contest, 67-59. The Ducks had their chances, but a missed free throw by Chris Harper with 21 seconds left in regulation and a partially blocked Blair Rasmussen shot at the closing of the first extra period, sealed Oregon's fate.

Oregon coach Don Monson said the schedule the Ducks have played early has been "disastrous." From top to bottom, the league doesn't have a "free lunch" team in its midst. Even Washington State, which finished in the conference's cellar last year (4-14), is sitting in a first place tie with the Beavers at 2-0. The Cougar program is doing so well (10-2 overall), that some people might forget about the days of George Raveling.

Monson has said the Ducks need to play "40 minutes" of basketball, not 36 or 34, and his words will ring true if the Ducks go into a dry spell against the Beavers, who are led by high-flying 6-9

forward A.C. Green. The senior, out of Portland's Benson High School, put on a clinic against Washington's West German connection of Detlef Schrempf and Christian Welp. Oregon's 2-3 match-up zone will have to contend with Green and OSU's three-guard offense.

Despite the uphill climb for the Ducks, Monson has found the leader he was searching for in replacing graduated forward David Brantley.

Six-foot-2 guard Harper has taken hold of the leadership reins after several up-and-down performances.

With the Beavers coming up Wednesday night, the task for Harper and the Ducks doesn't get any easier. OSU coach Ralph Miller has his team playing the best basketball in the league right now. Washington can attest to that after the Beavers knocked the Huskies out, 52-45 in Seattle.

Maybe the Ducks' hard knocks and OSU's 12-game win streak in the series will come to a screeching halt Wednesday. If not, there will be a lot of shovels ready around the Pac-10. But it is still early, and a few coaches in the conference think a champion could be crowned — even with five or six losses.

Wrestlers whip San Jose State on Cal road trip

San Jose State University led the Oregon wrestling team 18-0 before freshman 150-pounder Vince Hochanadel pinned the Spartans' Shannon Felix, leading the Ducks to a 31-18 come-from-behind victory in San Jose, Calif., Monday night.

Hochanadel's pin came with 2:30 left in the match and propelled the Ducks to sweep the remaining five matches. With the win, Oregon improved to 7-5 on the season.

Rick O'Shea, James Terry, Mike Harter, Cal Thomason and Brad Steward each collected wins against SJSU.

Oregon faces Stanford University tonight at 7 p.m. in Palo Alto, Calif., to conclude a seven-match road trip.

The Ducks' next home match is against Utah State University at McArthur Court on Saturday.

A loss against the Beavers would put the Ducks in a deep hole — one they may never climb out of if the rest of the teams in the Pac-10 keep shoveling on the dirt like the two Los Angeles schools did last week.
