Students fight for issues

Lobbying the Legislature

As state legislators return to Salem, the Oregon Student Public Interest Research Group is preparing to meet them with a small band of student interns who will press the group's consumer-oriented agenda.

OSPIRG has four interns working in Salem this term, addressing such issues as toxic waste, fair banking practices and public utilities. Students Jeff Bissonnette, Ann Frankel, Erik Nilsson and Jeb Bianco spend three to four days a week in the capitol and earn between nine and 12 credit hours for their work.

"This is really their chance to take what they're learning at the University and apply it to something practical," said Carol Benedick, OSPIRG state board chair.

The students will advocate specific legislation by lobbying lawmakers, providing testimony before legislative committees, and organizing private citizens behind their cause.

Nilsson is lobbying the Legislature to pass a "community right-to-know" law, which would require information concerning the location and transportation of toxic wastes be made public.

OSPIRG also is seeking an amendment to bank regulations

that would limit the time a bank may take to clear an out-of-state check. Bissonnette is devoting his internship to this issue, an issue of significance for out-of-state students.

Students from out of state often begin spending checks from home immediately after deposit even though it takes an average of 10 to 14 days at most banks for such checks to clear. Benedick said this leads to bounced checks, bad reputations for students, and unnecessary anguish as banks need no more than five days to clear out-of-state checks.

Bissonnette is also working on the danger of toxic substances in art supplies; he is representing OSPIRG's advocacy of stiffer labelling standards for such products. Cur-

rent standards are weak and do not adequately state the need for proper ventilation, Benedick said.

Frankel is working on public utility issues, including the "telephone buyer protection act" that, among other things, would require more clearly worded labels on telephones.

Currently, said Benedick, phones do not specify whether they are rotary or push-button models even when some rotary phones use push-button dials. Mistaking one style of phone for another can cause problems in getting proper phone service, particularly when using an alternative long distance or local measured service, she said.

Finally, Bianco is continuing his work from last term on voter registration. But rather than attempting to register new voters, he is attempting to maintain the current registration rules from amendments proposed during the last election.

Spurred by concerns over voter registration efforts by followers of the Bhagwan-Shree Rajneesh, who attempted to import hundreds of homeless people to vote in Wasco County elections, many people would like to see voter registration deadlines tightened. Benedick, however, said such restrictions would only hurt students whose frequent changes in residency make them vulnerable to stricter voting regulations.
