25 charged in Aquino death

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — A government prosecutor Wednesday charged the armed forces chief, Gen. Fabian Ver, two generals and 23 other men in the double murder of opposition leader Benigno Aquino, and the man the army claimed killed him.

The assassination of Aquino on Aug. 21, 1983, as he stepped off the airliner bringing him home from three years' self-exile in the United States, shocked the island nation and led to a year of protests against the pro-Western regime of Pres. Ferdinand Marcos.

Marcos, who initially indicated he supported the military's claim that Aquino was assassinated by communist agent Rolando Galman, later appointed a five-member fact-finding board whose 10-month probe led to today's charges.

Justice Bernardo Fernandez, government ombudsman, essentially followed the recommendations of the board's majority report.

Brig. Gen. Luther Custodio, chief of aviation security, and 16 other soldiers were charged with direct participation in a military conspiracy to kill Aquino.

Ver, Maj. Gen. Prospero Olivas and six other soldiers

were accused of being accessories in a military attempt to cover up the assassination and blame it on Galman. A civilian businessman, Hermilo Gosuico, was accused of being an accomplice to the conspiracy.

The charges against Custodio and the 16 other principals carry a possible death penalty.

Olivas headed the earlier military investigation into the murder.

Reagan awaits Soviet reply

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ronald Reagan said Wednesday he is waiting for the Kremlin to reply to a U.S. proposal to meet in Geneva in early March for a new round of nuclear arms talks. But, the president added, he doesn't believe the Soviets are dragging their feet.

"We have only recently settled on a date that we thought would be satisfactory to us," Reagan told The Associated Press in the first interview of his new term.

Asked why something seemingly so simple should take weeks to resolve, Reagan said, "We just haven't had an answer yet.... Obviously, if there is some reason that's not satisfac-

tory to them, we'll continue trying to find a date."

Two weeks ago, Secretary of State George Shultz and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko met in Geneva and agreed the two nations would resume discussions on reducing intermediate and long-range nuclear weapons, and would begin talks on how to prevent an arms race in space. But the date and place for the three-point talks were to be determined later, hopefully within a month.

In the wide-ranging, 25-minute discussion in the Oval Office, Reagan also said:

•He has been "discussing ways of capping" the fees doctors and hospitals charge Medicare patients, in an effort to hold down the rising costs of the Medicare program for the elderly and disabled. He said doctors would be free to stop serving Medicare patients if they wish, adding that government social programs have discouraged physicians from providing free medical care to the poor on their own initiative.

•There would be "great difficulties" in openly aiding Nicaraguan rebels, as some congressional leaders have proposed, because that would constitute an act of war under international law. But he restated his determination to continue to support "the people of

Nicaragua who are asking nothing more than freedom from totalitarianism."

•As "titular head of the (Republican) party," he should not encourage Vice Pres. George Bush to run for president in 1988.

Two held with stolen bikes

CENTRALIA, Wash. (AP) — Two Oregon men have been arrested in Centralia in connection with the possession of nearly 40 bicycles that police report had been stolen from the University campus in Eugene.

James Branson, 18, and Kendall Schaeffer, 20, both of Estacada, were arrested by Centralia police Wednesday morning for investigation of possession of stolen property charges, said police spokesman Tony Brekel.

Officers arrested the men after a service station owner noticed a rental truck parked behind his station. The station owner called police when he saw the bicycles inside. The pair was taken into custody after they returned from breakfast and began to leave in the truck.

Brekel estimated the value of the bikes at more than \$6,000.

The men were being held in Centralia pending extradition to Oregon.
