

Kirkpatrick to leave U.N.

WASHINGTON (AP) — After months of mystery about her future, U.N. Ambassador Jeane Kirkpatrick told President Ronald Reagan Wednesday she is leaving the administration. Kirkpatrick said she plans to resume teaching, writing and speaking out on foreign policy issues.

She refused to say whether Reagan had offered her another job in the administration. "During four years I have not commented in public on private conversations with the president," she said. "I don't think it's appropriate."

Kirkpatrick said she tendered her resignation to Reagan in a meeting Dec. 11, effective March 1 or sooner if a successor is chosen.

She said that if she had wanted "a top foreign policy job" in Reagan's second administration, she would have remained at the United Nations, which provides Cabinet status and "a window on the world."

But, Kirkpatrick added, she thought it was only fair that she resume her teaching post at Georgetown University, while it was still being held open for her.

White House spokesman Larry Speakes said her successor would be chosen "as soon as possible." He, too, refused to say if Reagan had offered her another job.

Arms poll: Results mixed

LOS ANGELES (AP) — More than half the U.S. public opposes President Ronald Reagan's proposal to conduct extensive research on "Star Wars" weaponry, and about two-thirds want to ban any use of weapons in space, a Los Angeles Times poll says.

At the same time, just over half of those taking part in the poll say they would rather risk destruction of the United States than be governed by the Soviet Union.

Two-thirds say the Soviets can't be trusted to keep arms treaties and 55 percent agree with Reagan's statement that the Soviet Union is an "evil

empire."

But the poll, conducted among 1,847 Americans from Jan. 19 through Jan. 24, also indicated an overwhelming majority of the respondents, nearly 80 percent, favor a freeze on nuclear weapons and a ban on future development of nuclear arms.

The Reagan administration opposes a freeze on the grounds it could not be verified and would lock the United States into military inferiority to the Soviet Union.

In the poll, published in the newspaper Wednesday, respondents said by a 2-1 margin that a space-based

defense system designed to protect the United States from enemy missiles would likely tip the nuclear balance of power by threatening the opposing nation.

Fifty-five percent of those surveyed said they would ban any Star Wars research.

The poll showed a significant shift from a March 1982 survey in which 7 percent of the respondents said the United States was the strongest nation militarily, and 41 percent picked the Soviet Union.

This time, the Times said, 25 percent picked the United States and 24 percent said the Soviet Union.

Aborted fetuses will be certified if law is passed

CINCINNATI (AP) — A city councilor has proposed a law that would require death certificates and burial or cremation for aborted fetuses.

The proposed ordinance by J. Kenneth Blackwell has been filed with the clerk of the City Council and could go before the council as early as today.

Blackwell said Tuesday that his proposal would require that "aborted human fetuses be buried, cremated or interred in a dignified and sanitary manner, and further that the death of a fetus whose life has been terminated as the result of a surgically induced abortion be subject to the same death certificate requirement as stillbirths."

Blackwell said his proposal would focus public attention on the abortion issue without interfering with the U.S. Supreme Court's 1973 decision to legalize abortion.

Ann Michelini, board member of the Ohio chapter of the National Abortion Rights Action League, was critical of the proposal. "...Large numbers of pregnancies, as many as 25 percent, end in natural abortions called miscarriages in the first three months," she said.

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
