

BYU drops Oregon easily

Oregon's wrestling team managed to win only two matches and score two draws, as visiting Brigham Young University whipped the Ducks, 29-10, in their final home appearance at McArthur Court Thursday night.

"This had to have been the worst meet we've ever wrestled at home," admitted Oregon coach Ron Finley, whose team dropped to 9-12 on the season. "We just weren't aggressive at all."

According to Finley, the referee set the tempo of the "sluggish" confrontation between the Ducks and the Cougars by not signalling any stalling calls throughout the match.

"After the tempo was set, neither team wrestled aggressively, and there was no room for mistakes," Finley said. "That's just not my style of wrestling."

Oregon freshman Roberto Pelayo opened the meet with a 7-3 victory over BYU's Mike Halbleib in the 118-pound bout. But the Ducks lost the next five matches to the Cougars and never threatened BYU from that point on.

In the 177-pound weight class, Mike Harter

collected the Ducks' only other win on the evening, as he slipped by BYU's Chris Bogard, 2-0. Harter's victory moved him into sole possession of second place on Oregon's all-time single-season victory list.

Harter, 36-7-1 on the season, is now just one victory away from matching Scott Bliss' record, which was set in 1978.

Oregon's Rick O'Shea drew with the Cougars' Arlen Olsen, 2-2, in the 167-pound bout, while the Ducks' heavyweight Lance Hohanadel also drew with BYU's Henry Williams, 1-1.

The Ducks suffered throughout the match because of a shifted lineup. Many of Oregon's wrestlers were competing at heavier weights because of injuries.

"Hopefully we can have our number one lineup back and be competitive by the Oregon State dual," Finley said of the Feb. 24 match with OSU in Corvallis.

The Ducks have two dual matches left in the regular season, as they travel to Washington to face Central Washington State University on Feb. 14, then conclude their season at OSU on Feb. 24.

Falcons fly by depleted Duck gymnasts

If modern medicine had produced a cure for the flu, Oregon women's gymnastics coach Ed Boyd could have used some of it last night.

The Ducks, with some gymnasts ailing from the flu, lost a dual meet to Seattle Pacific University Falcons by a score of 168.75-157.75 last night in Gerlinger Annex.

Oregon managed to open a slight lead over the Falcons after the vault and the uneven bars. But with Julie Weinstein out with the flu, Oregon turned in only four of five possible scores for the balance beam. Seattle Pacific outscored Oregon 41.35 to 31.8 in the event, and the Ducks never made up the difference.

Despite the loss, Boyd was pleased with the team's performance.

"As a team we did an incredible job," Boyd

said. "On the bars we were extremely strong."

In the uneven bars, Gretchen Kind turned in her best performance of the year with a 9.05 to lead an Oregon sweep of the event. Kind also took second overall in the balance beam event in winning the all-around honors for the meet with a 34.95.

"It was my best meet so far," said Kind of her first place finish. "I've been kind of sick lately, but I had a lot of confidence tonight."

Besides Kind's efforts, Oregon received an outstanding individual performance from freshman Cyndee Maxwell, who finished in third place all-around scoring. Maxwell tied for first place in the vault and finished third in the floor exercise with an 8.85.

Oregon's next meet is against the University of Washington Huskies in Seattle Saturday night.

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
