## Women's Day to be hailed

In celebration of International Women's Day, the Rape Crisis Network will sponsor an afternoon of cultural activities and fund rais-

ing events on Saturday.

Although International Women's Day, a holiday that originated in the United States more than 70 years ago, officially takes place today, the network decided to hold the event on Saturday when more women would be able to attend, said Patty Palmerantz, finance coordintor at the network.

"Chicana" will be presented at 1:30 p.m. and again at 8 p.m. in the EMU Forum Room. The \$3 admission charge benefits the Rape Crisis Network.

Between performances of the choreographed poem, a Cultural Celebration will be held at the Central Presbyterian Church, 1475 Ferry St., Palmerantz said. The celebration will feature cultural activities such as Native American and Israeli dancing, martiel arts, Filipino poetry and hula dancing.

### Nation-to-nation diplomacy show to air on KLCC

Eugene's radio station KLCC will broadcast the third "Global Town Meeting," live from U.S. Radio in Los Angeles Sunday, March 10 at 6:30 p.m. The purpose of the show, which will be broadcast out of Los Angeles every second Sunday each month, is to improve U.S.-Soviet relations through citizen, rather than government diplomacy. The show will feature on-the-air call-ins, allowing Americans to talk directly to Soviet citizens in Moscow via an 800 number.

This Sunday's show will feature John Nicolopolous, a veteran liason in U.S.-Soviet relations, Nannan Parry, former nuclear physicist and world-renowned expert on conflict resolution.

# Talk to address local evacuation

City Manager Mike Gleason will give a speech titled "Community Planning for Potential Nuclear Disaster" today at 3:30 p.m. in EMU Room 101. The talk is sponsored by the University Arms Control Forum, and will address the federal government's plans for protecting citizens in the case of a nuclear attack.

"I was asked to comment on the re-location plan the federal government has recommended for this area, and what kind of facilities are available," Gleason says. He says he will conduct the session in a question-and-answer format.

"Paul Olum referred us to Gleason because he had spoken with Paul about community planning. There are some bizarre plans for the Eugene area in case of nuclear war. The population is supposed to be evacuated somewhere beyond Roseburg," says Peter O'Day of the University Arms Control Forum.

The UACF, which has changed its name from the Falculty Arms Control Group, brings speakers from around the nation to the University to address issues of nuclear war.
