## Elections Board

Christopher Beauchamp withdrew his candidacy from the race for Incidental Fee Committee positions Friday, said Alan Contreras, Elections Board chair. Although Beauchamp's name still will be on the ballot Wednesday and Thursday, Contreras said votes for Beauchamp will not be counted.

The ballot measure to repeal the Oregon Commentator's funding has been removed from the ballot as members of the ASUO Constitution Court determined last week that the measure is unconstitutional, Contreras said. Because of the late notice, however, information about the ballot measure will appear in the 1985-86 Voter's Guide this week.

Students who are working as legislative interns in Salem this term and who will be off campus during the primary elections Wednesday and Thursday, as well as during the general elections April 24-25, can still vote, Contreras said. Ballots will be available in Rep. Mary Burrows' Capitol office, Room H386, during those days, Contreras said.

## IFC

The Incidental Fee Committee allocated more than \$1,200 in additional funds for groups that appeared before the committee during its appeals session Thursday.

The Survival Center received \$914 at the hearing. Of that amount, \$214 will be used for administrative costs and the remaining \$200 will fund the center's "special projects." In addition, the IFC approved \$500 to help fund Earth Week activities happening this week.

The Gay and Lesbian Alliance received an additional \$150 for library expansion and \$46 for administrative expenses.

The IFC allocated \$100 to the Chinese Student Association for the organization's director stipend.

## University Bookstore

The University Bookstore board of directors voted in favor of applying to become a lottery ticket outlet at the board's mon-

thly meeting, Wednesday. Seven members voted for the application, while two abstained from the voting.

Although the board approved the sale of lottery tickets, it will take several weeks before they find out if the Oregon State Lottery Commission will approve the application.

At the bookstore's annual meeting on Thursday, several people were nominated as candidates for seven vacant board positions, including Kari Kemp and Eric Apalategui for the two-year freshmen position.

For the sophomore position, Debra Liebowitz, Gwen Roedel, Kirsten Beck, Ken Turton, Lisa Douglas, Dan Goulet, Dan Mark, Darryl Joannides, Deidre Piccione and Allen Ricks were nominated.

Four graduate students were nominated for that position, including Ken Thowaitis, Jorern Wettern, Tom Ryan and John Bowman.

Toby Edson was the only faculty member nominated for the faculty position.

on the IFC, including negotiating with many different individuals and groups and working with budgets. She is also endorsed by the SPA and the Student Law Association.

Pellegrini thinks that minority groups on campus are extremely important, and funds for these groups should be fairly distributed to ensure diversity on campus. She said she would like to see the IFC hearing process streamlined to obtain greater efficiency and have the committee keep closer contact with individual groups in the future.

•Todd Walcott, a sophomore in pre-business, worked as the IFC's office manager this year. He said this position has taught him the current members' funding rationales and how the budget process operates. He also said that after attending many of the budget hearings, he became familiar with the different student groups.

Walcott decided to run for a spot on the IFC after this year's committee members suggested it to him. He said that it would be easy for him to work with all groups equally.

•James Randall, a sophomore in pre-business, is currently co-director of the Amazon Housing

Community. He said he has gained budget and management experience from this, as well as from working as manager for several local restaurants.

Randall thinks he can represent all students by bringing his background and experience to the IFC. He said he would like to see more support given to non-traditional minority students, such as older students with financial problems.

•Armando Morales, a sophomore majoring in Spanish and anthropology, is originally from Mexico but has lived and worked in the Eugene com-

munity for nine years as a musician. He has participated in several music festivals throughout Oregon and currently puts on a local Latin-American music program for KLCC. He is also a member of MEChA, which is endorsing his candidacy along with SPA.

Morales believes his experience with different cultural events would allow him to have a better knowledge of different groups' budget needs in this area. He is also concerned with minority representation, but said that his main priority would be to represent everyone fairly.
