Pushcart owner inserted 200 handbills, not 3,600

In Thursday's Oregon Daily Emerald, an article about a pushcart owner who inserted fliers into copies of the Emerald incorrectly reported the number of newspapers involved.

John Wilson admits he placed fliers into 200 newspapers, not the 3,600 previously reported.

Emerald advertising director Susan Thelen said she heard the figure from merchants near the bookstore.

"I got that figure because several merchants told me that all the papers at the bookstore had inserts, and when I went there, the papers were all gone," Thelen said.

Because 3,600 copies of the papers are dropped off at the bookstore every day, Thelen said she assumed that number was accurate.

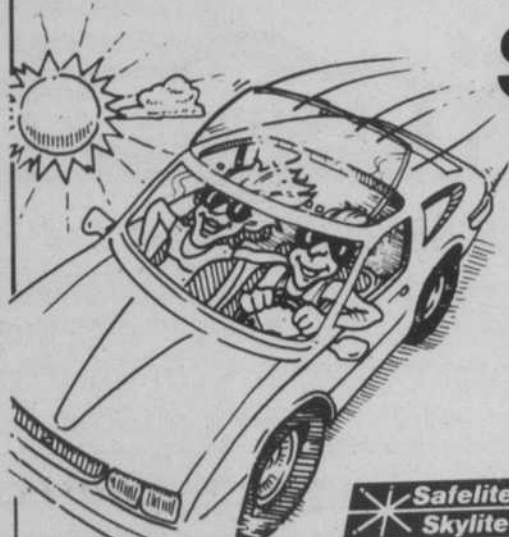
Wilson, who has apologized to the Emerald for inserting the fliers, said "I realize I made a mistake, and I'm willing to pay the bill for the inserts."

The inserts contained official public hearing notices with hand-written comments concerning area business owners.

Thelen said she believes that Wilson inserted only 200 fliers and probably will accept a \$42 payment for the inserts. But she has contacted the Emerald's corporate lawyers to discuss the possibility of filing a lawsuit.

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Law school hosts judges' conference

Women judges from five western states will gather in Eugene this weekend for the annual meeting of the District 13 National Women Judges Association at the University law school.

The public is invited to attend a student moot court competition at 1 p.m. today in Room 221 of the law school. The judges will participate in the competition.

At 3 p.m., the public may also listen to a panel discussion on issues affecting women lawyers and judges in Room 221.

Panelists will include Betty Rogers, Oregon Supreme Court justice; Carolyn Hayek, Washington State Supreme Court judge and District 13 director; RoseAnne Buckner, Washington State Superior Court judge; and Susan Starbuck, project director of Women Judges of Washington State.

"This is an outstanding opportunity for our students, faculty, graduates and others to meet this particular group of judges," says Peggy Nagae, assistant dean of the law school.

"As women, they have faced and overcome many obstacles," she says. "As women judges, they have additional hurdles and barriers. Their careers, suggestions and insights will be of tremendous value to our students."

On April 20-21, the judges will meet to discuss topics such as sexual bias, communication and stress.

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
