

Hayes grabs fifth in NCAA 10,000

Oregon senior Kathy Hayes finished fifth in the 10,000-meter finals on the opening day for qualifying and trials in the men's and women's NCAA track-and-field championships being held in Austin, Texas.

Hayes, the 1984 10,000 national champion (32:43.81), finished in 33:56.55 for her fifth-place finish behind winner Nan Doak from the University of Iowa (33:33.03).

Hayes' race was the only final event of the day. Mostly preliminaries and trial races were the main highlights of the day.

In the 800-meter trials, Oregon's Claudette Groenendaal and Leann Warren both won their heats. Warren's 2:03.02 was the best time of the day in all of the heats. Groenendaal finished in 2:04.3 in her heat.

Warren holds the collegiate record at the 800 (1:59.63), while Groenendaal's lifetime best is a 1:59.98. The 800 final will be on Friday.

The Ducks' Brenda Bushnell clocked the fifth best time in the

3,000-meters on Wednesday, a 9:26.46. Bushnell's best is a 9:22.58, and she will also run her final on Friday.

Today, the women competing in preliminaries will be: Sally Harmon (javelin), Shari Collins (high jump), Quenna Beasley (shot), and Rosa Gutierrez (5,000-meters).

On the opening day of qualifying for the men, junior Ken Flax met his two Swedish hammer-throwing foes. Flax finished in third place at 235-2.

San Jose State University's Kjell Bystedt finished the qualifying round in first place with a stadium record 236-9 while Washington State University's Tore Gustafsson was in second at 236-3. Finals begin at 11 a.m. on Friday.

The three are the top throwers in the nation, and there is a tight-knit rivalry among them.

Flax defeated Gustafsson at the Pacific-10 Conference Championships this year, avenging an earlier loss to Gustafsson during the Oregon-WSU dual meet. Bystedt was last year's NCAA runner-up, and he downed Gustafsson at the Oregon Pepsi Relays. But Gustafsson broke Bystedt's

Swedish national record, and Bystedt has been trying to regain it.

In the pole vault, another of the Ducks' conference champions, Kory Tarpenning, cleared 17-6 along with 15 other competitors to advance to the finals on Friday at 1 p.m.

Tarpenning has a career-best of 18-6, but he will have to face Oklahoma State University's Joe Dial, who broke the American pole vault record this year.

Matt McGuirk, in the 3,000-meter steeplechase, failed to qualify for the Friday final.

In today's competition, Brian Crouser takes the field for qualifying in the javelin, while Jeff Hultberg and Greg Aitkenhead will be in the shot put trying to qualify tonight.

The top marks in the javelin are near the 300-foot mark, and Crouser has a career best of 286-0.

On the track, Dub Myers will run in the 1,500 trials and so will Mike Blackmore in the 5,000. Myers finished fifth in the 1,500 as a freshman and third last year at the NCAA's.

Miller enlists with Seattle Mariner baseball organization

Following in the path of Eugene's prominent two-sport athlete Danny Ainge, Oregon quarterback Chis Miller will try to navigate the baseball world as well as the football one.

On Tuesday night, Miller signed a professional baseball contract to play with the Seattle Mariners for their Northwest Class A Bellingham farm team this summer.

"I can't pass this up," Miller says of playing for Seattle. "It is an opportunity that comes once in a lifetime."

Miller, who passed for 1,712 yards in 1984 for third place on the Oregon all-time list, signed to play for the Washington minor-league club and will join the team when the University's spring term ends on June 16.

The Sheldon High School graduate will remain eligible to play football for the Ducks this fall when drills start in August.

"They (Mariners) have said they are not going to interfere with football," says Miller, who will bring a football and a projector along to watch game films during the baseball season.

Miller was given an undisclosed bonus and will receive a standard \$700 monthly salary. The Mariners also will pay the remaining two years of Miller's schooling, which is approximately \$9,000.

Because of his professional status in one sport, Miller will have to relinquish his NCAA football scholarship. But despite his professional status in baseball, Miller will be eligible to play football for the Ducks.

The Mariners will allow Miller to join the Ducks in August for fall drills; Oregon coach Rich Brooks has set Aug.

9 as a tentative date for fall drills because of a possible schedule change.

The Ducks were originally scheduled to open the 1985 campaign against the University of Colorado on Sept. 14, but WTBS, the cable superstation in Atlanta, is interested in televising the Oregon-Washington State University game on Aug. 29 in Pullman, Wash.

The Ducks and Miller will find out for sure this weekend if WTBS will broadcast the Oregon-WSU game when CBS announces its fall television football schedule on June 1.
