

Writers' group to 'colonize' at coast for July workshops

Students interested in adding some literary creativity to their vacations may join professional and novice writers at the Oregon Writers Colony summer session at the Lodge at Little Beach, in Gearhart, Ore.

"I think it's the only (session) around in Oregon where people actually live where they take their classes, and the teachers are right there," says Marlene Howard, co-president of the organization. Howard says this is the third summer the sessions have been offered.

The entire week — which includes classes, room and board — costs \$300. Costs include \$100 for the weekend session, \$50 for one day and \$150 for the classes, Howard says.

From July 7 to July 19, classes will be held in "Writing the Suspense Novel," "Lessons on Becoming a Writer," "Photography," "Writing — A Short Course," "The Novel" and "Writing and Selling Non-Fiction."

The two week-long sessions will include

five three-hour classes plus conference time with instructors.

Guest lecturers at the conference include Don James, "the venerable old man of Oregon writers" who inspired the 1983 establishment of OWC, and Tom Ferte, director of the Monmouth Institute of Creative Writing.

Other guest lecturers are Jim Magner, journalism instructor at Portland Community College and winner of the 1985 National Writing Teacher Award; Larry Leonard, freelance writer; Larry Brooks, script writer; Don Berry, novelist and author of "Trask"; David Hedges, poet; and Paul Pintarich, book review editor for Northwest Magazine of The Oregonian.

One scholarship for the session will be given.
