



## Higher-education budget approved

**SALEM (AP)** — A state System of Higher Education budget with a general-fund increase of about 5 percent was easily approved Thursday by the House.

The higher education budget, which lawmakers have said contains the largest increase of any state agency budget approved so far by this session, was sent to Gov. Vic Atiyeh on a 32-2 vote.

The \$452 million general-fund budget includes \$1.4 million to freeze tuition at the eight state colleges and universities during the 1986-87 school year.

Money for faculty salary increases is included in a separate bill pending in a salary subcommittee headed by Sen. Ed Fadel. D-Eugene. Higher education officials are seeking \$40 million for the salary boosts.

Also in a separate bill is \$11.6 million sought by Atiyeh for economic development-related program expansions at four colleges.

## Contra aid wins approval

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The Senate voted Thursday to approve \$38 million in non-weapons logistical aid to anti-Sandinista rebels and to repeal a strict prohibition against U.S. support for military action inside Nicaragua.

The vote was 55 to 42.

President Ronald Reagan praised the Senate action as "a display of bipartisan concern for the people of Central America and our own national security."

The aid amendment would provide \$14 million this year and \$24 million next year, resuming direct U.S. assistance to rebels fighting to overthrow Nicaragua's leftist government.

The Nicaraguan Embassy, in a statement from its press office, called the Senate action "an escalation of U.S. involvement and a major step down the road to interjection of U.S. combat troops."

The statement said the aid would "prolong

bloodshed in Nicaragua and is one more obstacle to an early, peaceful resolution of the conflict."

The Democratic-controlled House, which has led opposition to CIA aid to the guerrilla forces in Nicaragua known as contras, is expected to vote on a similar proposal next week.

Reagan, in a statement released by the White House, said the Senate amendment would "provide support for the freedom fighters who are struggling for liberty and democracy in Nicaragua. The Senate has seen that their struggle is ours — that they need and deserve the help of the American people."

He urged the House "to join with the Senate in sending a signal to both the Sandinistas and to the struggling Nicaraguan democratic opposition: The only resolution to the tragedy in Nicaragua is the same course which the Congress has supported in El Salvador — that of democracy, reconciliation and liberty."

## Body believed to be Nazi

**EMBU, Brazil (AP)** — Police exhumed a body in this quiet town Thursday that they believe is Dr. Josef Mengele, the sadistic Auschwitz "Angel of Death" who became the symbol of Nazi evil.

Romeo Tuma, a federal police chief, said he was "90 percent convinced" that a man who died in 1979, and was buried as an Austrian, was the doctor whose bizarre and cruel medical "experiments" on Jewish prisoners made a shocking page even in Adolf Hitler's book of horrors.

Leading Nazi hunters were skeptical.

Jose Antonio de Mello, assistant director of the Sao Paulo morgue, said it would be difficult to determine whether the disarrayed bones were those of the man who sent hundreds of thousands of people to gas chambers.

## Israel finishes withdrawal

**ACHZIV, Israel (AP)** — Israel's army completed its withdrawal from Lebanon on Thursday, the senior commander said, three years to the day after it invaded the country to crush the Palestine Liberation Organization.

"The withdrawal is actually over, but some troops will continue to go in and out," Maj. Gen. Ori Orr, commander of Israeli troops in Lebanon, told The Associated Press.

The AP dispatch was submitted to the Israeli military censor, who ordered significant material deleted.

Israel began pulling its troops out Feb. 16 in a multi-staged operation.

Prime Minister Shimon Peres and other senior officials have said some soldiers would remain temporarily to make certain the sensitive area near the border remains quiet and guerrillas do not infiltrate.

Israeli military officials said earlier that troops remaining in Lebanon numbered in the hundreds and most were assigned to help the South Lebanon Army, a Christian-dominated militia of about 2,000 men.

At the height of Israel's involvement, which began on June 6, 1982, more than 25,000 of its soldiers were in Lebanon. Since then, 654 Israelis have been killed there and 3,856 wounded.
