



Negotiations begin on budget package

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House and Senate begin compromise talks this week on a budget for the 1986 fiscal year, with the toughest bargaining expected over Social Security and President Ronald Reagan's defense buildup.

Both houses have approved budgets designed to trim the deficit by \$56 billion next year but by dramatically different means.

The plan approved by the Republican-controlled Senate proposes a one-year freeze in Social Security benefits and other pension programs. It would allow the defense budget to rise with inflation, and terminate more than a dozen domestic relief programs.

The Democratic-controlled House countered with a plan that safeguards the Social Security increases slated for next year. It provides no inflationary increase in spending authority for the Pentagon.

Chinese exchange finalized

SALEM (AP) — The State System of Higher Education and Oregon's Chinese sister province of Fujian have signed an agreement to exchange professors, students and expertise.

The agreement with the Fujian Bureau of Higher Education allows for the admission of 15 to 20 Chinese graduate students to Oregon colleges in the 1986-87 school year.

It also allows for the exchange, in the fall of 1986, of three English-speaking instructors in Chinese literature, Chinese history and Chinese forest economics for three Oregon professors in international trade, industrial management and forest economics.

In addition, Oregon would

send four English language instructors to the Fujian universities in exchange for four Chinese language instructors.

The agreement, signed Friday, has "laid a solid foundation and opened the way for future prospects," Wang Zhixin, director of the Commission for Education, Science, Culture and Public Health, said through a translator.

An eight-member Fujian delegation has been touring Oregon's private, public and two-year community colleges to glean ideas for its reform of the province's higher education.

The delegation visited the University Wednesday and

Thursday, and toured the library, Johnson Hall, a dormitory and the Museum of Art. The museum, repository for a large collection of historic Chinese art treasures, was the site of a Thursday luncheon hosted by President Paul Olum.

Fujian province, located on the southeast coast of China, is one of two provinces set aside as a special economic zone for investment growth and foreign trade.

The current higher education reform movement in China has begun to broaden the curriculum of students there, said Li Pu, deputy director of the Fujian Bureau of Higher Education.



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
