Distinguished contributions to be recognized on Sunday

Three people will receive Distinguished Service Awards during the June 16 commencement for their contributions to the cultural development of Oregon or society as a whole.

The awards, which are equivalent to honorary degrees, will go to Henry Richmond of Portland, Helmuth Rilling of Stuttgart, West Germany, and Jean Siddall of Lake Oswego. They will be honored at ceremonies beginning at noon at Hayward Field.

Richmond, a co-founder and executive director since 1975 of 1000 Friends of Oregon, has gained state, regional and national acclaim for his role in Oregon land use planning as an advocate for adherence to high standards and protection of land use goals.

The author of chapters on land use in the 1975 and 1977 Oregon State Bar publication, Richmond was co-editor of the first and second editions of the bar's 27-chapter text, "Land Use." He also is the editor of Landmark, a quarterly journal of 1000 Friends, and of 1000 Friends Newsletter.

In 1972, he argued the first case under Oregon's land use law, Petersen v. City of Klamath Falls, in the Oregon Supreme Court, obtaining a reversal of two lower court rulings.

The second award-winner, Rilling, artistic director and conductor of the Oregon Bach Festival since its founding in 1970, has directed orchestras in Berlin, Israel and Los Angeles. He is professor of conducting at the

State Academy of Music, Frankfurt and directs the International Bach Academy in Stuttgart and the Bach academies in Tokyo and Buenos Aires, which he founded.

His discography of more than 200 releases includes the 15-year project of recording all of Bach's extant cantatas.

Since he came to the University 15 years ago to teach a workshop and conduct a concert, Rilling has led the Oregon Bach Festival to its current reputation as one of the premier events of its kind in the United States.

The third Distinguished Service Award winner, Siddall, is founder and chair of the board of directors of the Oregon Rare and Endangered Plant Project. With the assistance of botanists around the state, including David Wagner, University Herbarium director, and Kenton Chambers, Oregon State University Herbarium curator, she compiled the first list of the state's rare, threatened and endangered plants.

In support of her conviction that natural areas are needed within cities to keep them livable, Siddall and Lucille Beck organized the Friends of Tryon Creek Park in 1970.

Their fund-raising and other efforts resulted in the creation of what is now a 600-acre state park along Tryon Creek between Portland and Lake Oswego for which she received the Governor's Keep Oregon Livable Award in 1976 and Lewis and Clark College's Aubrey Watzek Award in 1974.

Quality teaching nets awards

Three University faculty members have been chosen the first recipients of the Burlington Northern Faculty Achievement Awards.

Christopher Edson, associate professor of educational policy and management; Dominic LaRusso, speech professor; and Ingrid Weatherhead, senior instructor of Norwegian, will be recognized for their teaching excellence June 16 during the University's spring commencement.

The new awards of \$2,000 each are funded by

an \$18,000 grant from Burlington Northern to the University Foundation. The grant enables the University in the next two years to reward a similar number of professors for their high quality teaching.

Edson, a full-time faculty member since 1973, offers courses that students consistently describe as models of organization and clarity.

An educational historian, Edson teaches upper-division and graduate courses in such subjects as history of childhood and the family, social foundations of teaching, and education, youth and history.

LaRusso, a University faculty member since 1968, teaches undergraduate and graduate courses in topics ranging from the theory and literature of rhetoric to nonverbal communication.

He also teaches classes in the Robert D. Clark Honors College, law school and humanities program.

Weatherhead has been a University Germanic languages and literature instructor since 1968.

She was also a key figure in the growth and development of Scandinavian studies at Oregon and chaired the Scandinavian Studies Committee in 1983-84.

Two faculty members were selected to receive the 1985 Ersted Awards for Distinguished Teaching. Frances Cogan, assistant professor of literature in the honors college, and Helen Geron, associate professor of accounting, will each receive a \$1,000 cash prize made possible by a trust fund created by the late A.J. Ersted of Ather-ton, Calif.

Paul "Jerry" Rudy, professor of biology and director of the Oregon Institute of Marine Biology, is the recipient of the 1985 Charles E. Johnson Memorial Award for his beliefs in freedom of speech, the need to adapt to change, and openness to all ideas.

Corvallis engineer appointed to board

Gov. Vic Atiyeh has appointed a Corvallis man to a four-year term on the State Board of Higher Education.

Robert Adams will begin his term on the 11-member board July 1. His appointment must be confirmed by the Oregon Senate.

The board determines policy for the State System of Higher Education, which oversees the eight state colleges and universities. With the assistance of the chancellor and his staff, the board monitors the administration of the institutions to assure they are administered in accordance with approved policies, programs and budgets.

Adams is the vice president and director of civil engineering of CH2M Hill, a Corvallis engineering company. He has earned bachelor's degrees from Oregon State University and the University of Colorado, and a master's degree from Yale University.

Adams replaces Edward Harms Jr. of Springfield, whose term will expire June 30.
