



Special studies, activities, and sun should result in stimulating campus

Special studies, events and activities promise to make summer 1985 an interesting and exciting time at the University.

Studies and activities for personal enrichment and career development are scheduled along with a variety of events planned strictly for their fun and entertainment value.

The Family Wellness Camp, formerly the Family Vacation College, is scheduled Aug. 4-9. The wellness camp is built on the concept that families can benefit from health maintenance and lifestyle management instruction. It offers participants the chance to take part in recreational adventures, have computerized health and fitness appraisals and explore family dynamics and communication patterns.

There are no entrance re-

quirements or examinations, and college credit is optional. Enrollment is limited to the first 20 families and first 10 single adults who pay the \$50 deposit fee.

The Grace Graham Vacation College for adults returns this summer with the theme, "Creativity: Shaping a Human World." Set for Aug. 18-25, it involves morning lectures by University professors on such topics as literature, history, law, mathematics and politics. Two sessions of a geology-astronomy field workshop for families are being offered by the University Alumni Association. The workshops will examine Oregon's high desert country. The association also is repeating its popular marine science program for alumni and their families on the southern Oregon coast.

University geology Professor Lloyd Staples will guide participants on an educational adventure to investigate Central Oregon's many geological formations from July 28-31 and

from July 31-Aug. 3. Participants will also be able to observe sophisticated astronomical research at the University's Pine Mountain Observatory near Bend.

A marine biology discovery workshop is planned for Aug. 18-20 at the Oregon Institute of Marine Biology in Charleston. The discovery workshop will provide opportunities for people to explore marine life and ecology first-hand.
