Organization paints bleak picture of Nicaraguan life

About 125 perspiring people filled a hall in the Westley Center on Friday to listen as members of the Oregon Witness for Peace organization presented the results of a two-week fact-finding mission in Nicaragua.

Twenty witnesses, ranging in age from 15 to 70, formed the delegation, which toured the mountainous Jinotega provinces of Nicaragua and Managua, the nation's capital. Jinotega, a large coffee-producing region, is the scene of many violent confrontations between Contras, or counter-revolutionaries, and farmers.

Witness for Peace is a Christian-based group that monitors U.S. influence and activity in Nicaragua. The group seeks to document Contra atrocities against Nicaraguan civilians and the success of government programs, such as literacy campaigns, health care improvements and agricultural reform.

The goal of the group is to mobilize public opinion and help change U.S. foreign policy to one that fosters justice, peace and friendship, according to the delegation.

The delegation presented slides of their trip, with narration by 10 of the members who provided the factual background of the report. Interviews with Nicaraguan citizens were juxtaposed with questions addressed to U.S. embassy official, Michael Donovan.

Cora, a young woman who lived with her family in an agricultural cooperative, described how the Contras attacked her home and killed her mother, infant son and father, a leader in the collective.

Donovan, in response to Witness interviewers, defended Contra destruction of the farm, asserting that such cooperatives are "legitimate targets" because they are economically tied to the Nicaraguan government.

The Nicaraguan literacy campaign also has been hard-hit by Contra attacks. According to the

delegates' report, the nationwide effort has reduced illiteracy in Nicaragua from 50 percent in 1979 to 12 percent this year. The number of schools has doubled during that time, and the teaching force has grown from 12,500 teachers in 1979 to a present pool of 41,000.

The life force of the country's educational program now is a group of Managua students interrupting their own studies to travel the isolated rural areas as teachers for adults and children. According to the witnesses, this "Literacy Brigade" originally numbered 1,600, but many have been kidnapped or killed. Heike Eubanks, of Salem, said 60 schools have been destroyed by Contras in Jinotega alone.

A good deal of the presentation focused on a Jinotega agricultural cooperative. Members showed slides of washing areas, a drinking water system, farming equipment and new houses with metal roofs.

do you fix first?"

A committee will be formed to decide how to spend the University share of the money, but in the end some crucial work will have to be put on hold, Seibert says.

Some of the work that has been identified as "crucial" by Seibert, as well as others, includes modifications of Allen Hall, the Computing Center, Villard Hall, and the Main Library, all of which are largely inaccessible.

Most of these buildings house special programs, such as the KWAX radio program in Villard Hall, which cannot be moved to other locations for the handicapped student's use.

Since many of the University's buildings were constructed before access was an important consideration, many architectural barriers, like front steps that raise or lower a building's entrance, were incorporated.

This, plus the fact that the University has more than 53 separate buildings that had to be made accessible, has further complicated the problem, Rowe says.

The work on some buildings just moves faster and is less expensive than others, he adds.

The total cost of making Allen Hall accessible, for example, would be more than \$120,000, and it would take more than

\$210,000 for the Computing Center to be barrier-free, Rowe says.

But he is quick to point out that all new buildings and reconstruction on any existing facilities must include accessibility plans, which means that the problem is not being compounded.

Rowe and Seibert agree, however, that progress has been too slow in this area.

"I'm glad that we will be getting some money," Seibert says. But she says that the University still is operating on an illegal basis.

"This is still an unresolved situation," she says.
