Heating help available for low-income households

Of the Emersid A program designed to help low-income households offset the rising costs of heating bills is once again underway in Lane County.

households offset the rising costs of heating bills is once again underway in Lane County. The Low Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP) provides a one-time only energy assistance payment that is credited to the household's primary fuel supplier, says Mike White, program supervisor. The maximum payment per residence is \$240. The program assists residents whose annual income is at or balow 125 percent of the federal poverty lawed. S6 563 for a one-percent of the federal poverty

The program assists residents whose annual income is at or below 125 percent of the federal poverty level — \$6,563 for a one-person household, or \$8,813 for a two-person household. About 70 percent of the persons served have a monthly income of \$500 or less. White says.

Eligibility is based solely on income and federal law states the elderly and the disabled have priority in

the program, he says.

White says the program will operate on a \$1.6 million budget provided by the Department of Health and Human Services for 1986. Lane County receives 10 percent of Oregon's total budget of \$24 million, which is down \$2 million from last year, he says.

While the budget has decreased, the demand for help has not. Although about 8.750 households received assistance last year, more and more people are requesting aid. White says 33 percent of last year's clients were new applicants, and he expects the same situation this year.

Households who fail to qualify for LIEAP may be able to receive assistance from several alternative programs. The Gas Assistance Program (GAP), which operates through Northwest Natural Gas, provides aid for gas heating crises with a \$10,000 budget allocated from LIEAP. Two programs operating through the Salvation Army, one in Eugene and one in Springfield, consider other expenses, such as medical bills and family emergencies, when screening applicants.

The Eugene Public Utility District (EPUD) sponsors Project Helping Hand, which is funded through donations from ratepayers. Households can receive up to \$125 in aid, says Debbie Childs. EPUD credit representative. Childs says the project will operate on a \$2,000 budget this year.

A similar program sponsored by the Springfield Utility Board (SUB) provides up to \$125 in assistance but applicants must have received a shut-off notice from their utility company in order to qualify for aid. says a Salvation Army employee. The Project Share program is funded through a \$5,000 donation from SUB.
