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
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

Perhaps the most touching scene involves Ruth and a friend of Olga's who has been committed to an asylum. They communicate through innocent touching, feeling the texture of one another's hair, and then turning to Olga. Olga accepts the gesture but cannot return it. The immediacy and honesty and openness of Ruth is immediately linked with that of the mentally and emotionally disturbed. Quite the opposite of Olga, I think, but the relationship between these opposites is a mutually-rewarding friendship.

Von Trotta doesn't allow for simple or simplistic relationships, and it is the complications which make "Sheer Madness" a brilliant. powerful exploration of human relationships and
