Ducks go to Portland for NorPac swimming

The Oregon women's swim team will be looking to place in the top three for the second straight year when they head to Portland today through Saturday for the NorPac swimming championships.

The meet, which will be held at the Tualatin Hills Aquatic Center, will be co-hosted by Oregon and Oregon State University.

"(The University of California) Berkeley will win, and the University of Washington will be in second," says Oregon coach Dan Cole. "We just want to be closer to Cal and Washington than last year."

Last year California finished in first with 1,494 points, Washington was in second with 1,003 and Oregon finished third with 568.

The nationally-ranked Bears are led by junior Mary T. Meagher, a three-time Olympic gold medalist and sophomore Conny van Bentum, an NCAA champion.

For the Ducks to close-in on Washington, Cole feels they'll need a good effort from the entire team.

"They all swam well last week, and they should do well this week," Cole says of his team's performance at the PacWest Invitational. "We need good swims from everybody."

At last week's PacWest Invitational, the Ducks finished in second behind Washington, 1,315-967, but ahead of Washington State University, Oregon's closest competition for third at the NorPac meet.

Oregon had lost to WSU twice earlier in the season, but the Ducks came back to defeat the Cougars at the PacWest meet.

"We should finish ahead of WSU," Cole says. "We had never beaten them before in PacWest, so it could be a good indication of things to come."

One of the reasons Cole expects Washington to stay ahead of the Ducks is numbers.

"They have too many people," Cole says. "Washington will enter 20 people in the meet, which is the maximum allowed. We don't even have 20 capable people in the program yet. We'll only be using 15 people."

The Ducks will also be hoping to qualify some people for the NCAA championships to be held in Fayetteville, Ark., March 20-22.

Cole says he expects senior Babette Brundage, in the 200- and 400-yard individual medley, and junior Gwen Roedel, in the 1,650- and 500-yard freestyle, to have the best chances at making it to the NCAA meet.
