

### House votes to urge U.S. to investigate Waldheim

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House voted Tuesday to urge a speedy U.S. investigation of former U.N. Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim's alleged Nazi past that could bar his entry into the United States.

The House approved the resolution on a voice vote under expedited procedures. It was approved earlier in the day by the House Judiciary Committee on a 31-0 vote.

The resolution met no strong opposition on the House floor, but concern was voiced in the committee meeting that U.S. congressional action might influence upcoming elections in Austria.

Rep. Romano Mazzoli, D-Ky., chairman of the immigration subcommittee, said all members of the subcommittee agreed to forgo full hearings on the issue on the grounds that "time was of the essence" and that the resolution should be handled quickly.

"I'm trying to figure out what the urgency is," said Rep. Henry Hyde, R-Ill. "I suspect the urgency is that Mr. Waldheim is engaged in a runoff election in his country and the

urgency is to get this verdict in before the election."

Supporters conceded that the U.S. Justice Department has an investigation already under way and that the resolution simply would put Congress on record in support of the procedure.

"It would perhaps give additional sanction and comfort to those who are involved in this activity," said Mazzoli.


Hyde, who went on to vote in favor of the resolution, said it might be better to defer congressional action until after the June 8 Austrian presidential runoff election so as not to have any influence on the vote.

Rep. Hamilton Fish of New York, ranking Republican on the committee, said he was aware of the risk but decided that it was more important that the United States take a stand as a matter of principle.

"For the United States not to make a decision at this time is too close an analogy to the silence that was evidenced by the civilized world some 44 years ago," Fish said.

### Typhoon leaves thousands homeless

PORT MORESBY, Papua New Guinea (AP) — Typhoon Namu may have left more than one-third of the Solomon Islands' population homeless, a news report said, and widespread damage forced the postponement of foreign relief efforts Tuesday.

There has been no official figure on the death toll or number of people made homeless in the Pacific chain. The Australian Associated Press, in a report from Port Moresby, quoted unidentified relief workers in estimating 90,000 people were homeless and 50 others missing.

Officials said the storm roared

in Monday packing winds of 115 mph that downed power lines, uprooted trees, tore roofs off homes and caused rivers to burst their banks.

Early reports from the Solomon Islands official broadcast service said damage to the nation's copra crop was severe.

"But we're still not sure of the extent of damage," said Dykes Angiki, news editor of the Solomon Islands Broadcasting Corp. He told The Associated Press by telephone

that the Guadalcanal plains outside Honiara, the capital, and outlying islands were badly affected.

"Some places are very remote," he said. "It will take a couple of days before we know the toll."

The Solomons, located 1,000 miles northeast of Australia, have a population of about 240,000. The Guadalcanal plain was the site of the first U.S. victory against Japanese land-based forces in World War II.

### U.N. helicopter fired upon

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — A United Nations helicopter carrying the French ambassador to Lebanon and two French National Assembly delegates was hit by ground fire Tuesday and made an emergency landing, the French Embassy reported.

Sources at the embassy reported no one was injured.

The helicopter encountered a hail of machine gun and anti-aircraft fire near the southern port city of Tyre, according to the sources, who spoke on con-

dition of anonymity. It landed in an area policed by the U.N. Interim Force in Lebanon near Tyre.

The helicopter, which was piloted by Italians, carried French Ambassador Christian Graeff and delegates Jean-Francois Deniau, a Gaullist, and Andre Bellon, a Socialist, the sources said.

They had been returning to Beirut from a visit to the French battalion that is part of the U.N. peacekeeping force in southern Lebanon.

UNIFIL's command provided another Italian-piloted helicopter that flew the two French delegates and the ambassador safely to Beirut, according to the embassy sources.
