

'Give Peace a Dance' fund-raiser set for weekend

A 12-hour dance marathon for world peace set for Saturday seeks to raise money to stop the arms race, find alternatives to nuclear war, and make Oregon the first state to begin phasing out the production of nuclear weapons.

"Give Peace A Dance" is co-sponsored by Citizens for Lasting Security, KRXX AM 1450 and Citizens for a Nuclear Free Oregon. The marathon will be held from 2 p.m. Saturday to 2 a.m. Sunday at the WOW Hall, 8th Avenue and Lincoln Street.

If each dancer raises \$10 for every hour of dancing, the \$20,000 goal that has been set for the evening will be met, sponsors say.

The proceeds will be used to promote a initiative petition designed to give a 30 percent tax credit to companies that convert from the production of nuclear weapons to consumer products. If the petition gains the required signatures and is approved by voters on the November ballot, it could phase out the production of nuclear weapons components in Oregon by 1990.

Those people interested in participating must raise at least \$30 in pledges before Saturday and bring the pledge sheets to WOW Hall in order to qualify.

Participants can dance alone or in teams of two or more people during the marathon. Team members seek individual pledges for the hours their whole team

dances, and each team must keep one dancer on the floor at all times.

Four bands will keep dancers on their feet for the entire 12 hours. Shakabuku will kick things off at 2 p.m., followed by Loose Wimmis from 5 to 7:30 p.m. Shumba will play from 8 to 10:30 p.m., and James T and The Tough will provide the finale.

Prizes will be awarded to the dancer who brings in the most pledges by June 6, dancers who last all 12 hours, and to the best dressed dancers.

Sponsors are charging \$5 general admission to help meet the \$20,000 goal. Marathon dancers will be admitted free.
