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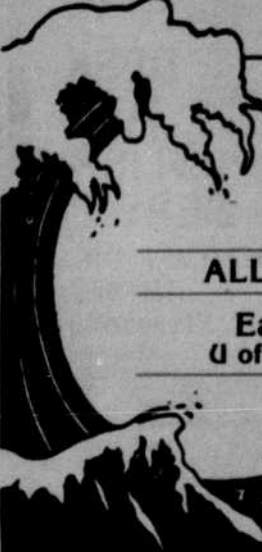

Soldiers leave hotel

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Civilians and soldiers backing Arturo Tolentino, who had declared himself president in place of Corazon Aquino, began filing out of a luxury hotel early Tuesday after being holed up there for two days.

Tolentino announced late Monday that his civilian backers would leave the hotel at dawn Tuesday, but there had been some question whether about 100 soldiers who had joined the revolt at the Manila Hotel would withdraw.

However, a spokesman said the soldiers agreed to leave to avoid a confrontation with soldiers loyal to Aquino.

Tolentino, the running mate of ousted President Ferdinand Marcos in February's fraudulent election, had left the hotel with a small group of his civilian supporters Monday night.

Party wins mandate

TOKYO (AP) — The govern-

ing Liberal Democrats won Japan's biggest postwar election victory, increasing chances that party rules will be changed so Prime Minister Yasuhiro Nakasone can stay in office beyond October.

The vote was seen as a mandate for Nakasone's pro-Western policies and his plans for domestic economic change.

Election boards in the 47 states said after counting the ballots cast Sunday that government party candidates won 300 of the 512 seats in the powerful House of Representatives.

More women smoke

DETROIT (AP) — College women are more likely than college men to smoke cigarettes, suggesting that the tobacco industry is successfully linking female smoking with an image of glamour and success, according to a federal study released Monday.

"The cigarette companies emphasize two major themes in getting women to smoke: One is trying to associate smoking with being liberated and the other is more subliminal, but not very subtle, and that is that women should smoke to stay thin," social psychologist Lloyd D. Johnston said.

Court upholds paper

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Suburban school officials violated the constitutional rights of student journalists by deleting articles on divorce and teen pregnancy from a high school newspaper, a divided federal appeals court ruled Monday.

In issuing its opinion, a three-judge panel of the 8th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals reversed a ruling last year by U.S. District Judge John Nangle. Nangle concluded that publication of the Spectrum newspaper at Hazelwood East High School was a classroom laboratory exercise and therefore exempt from the First Amendment guarantees of freedom of speech and freedom of the press.

But the appellate panel ruled that Spectrum was a public forum for the expression of student opinion and protected by the First Amendment.

Role remarked upon

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration said Monday it wants to find out whether deposed Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos played a role in the latest uprising against the government of Corazon Aquino.

While rebuking supporters of Marcos for the rebellion over the weekend, the White House did not immediately make it clear whether the uprising would jeopardize Marcos' stay in this country.

Registry necessary

SALEM (AP) — U.S. Sen. Bob Packwood said Monday a new congressional study shows the need to move toward a national registry or possibly a national driver's license for truckers hauling hazardous material.

At a news conference, Packwood responded to a research report issued Monday by Congress' Office of Technology Assessment.

The report says gasoline is the most dangerous cargo in the nation's transportation system.

Radioactive material makes up less than 3 percent of all hazardous materials shipments, the report says, and toxic chemical waste comprises about 7 percent of shipments.

Packwood said an estimated 41,300 trucks carrying hazardous materials entered Oregon in 1985.

Settlement approved

SALEM (AP) — Oregon could receive as much as \$17 million under an oil overcharge lawsuit settlement approved Monday, Attorney General Dave Frohnmayer said.

The negotiated settlement was approved by the U.S. District Court in Wichita, Kan. Frohnmayer last month submitted the settlement to the court on behalf of all 56 states, possessions and territories affected by the case.

He said the case involves overpricing of crude oil by refiners during the period of federal price regulation from 1973-81.



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
