Bomb kills inspector

PARIS (AP) — A bomb ripped through a police building in central Paris Wednesday, killing a police inspector and injuring 27 other people, fire officials said.

The explosion shortly before 4 p.m. knocked out walls and windows on the fifth and sixth floors of the building, an annex to police headquarters. It houses offices of the Bandit Repression Brigade, organized to respond quickly to emergencies.

Police reported no immediate claim of responsibility.

Clubbing ban called for

TORONTO (AP) — A royal commission has concluded that clubbing baby seals to death is just as humane as methods used in slaughterhouses, but the practice should be stopped because public opinion is against it, news reports said Wednesday.

The commission, whose full report on Canada's sealing industry will be released in September, recommended an official ban on killing white-coated, harp seal pups.

South Africa lifts ban

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — The government said Wednesday it had made a mistake, and lifted a two-day-old ban on union meetings a few hours after four black unions challenged it in court.

The Bureau for Information said the original ban on meetings by 33 organizations in the Johannesburg area "contained certain errors," and a revised order would be issued Thursday.

It said the new order would cover only Soweto, the huge black township outside Johannesburg, and would exclude all trade unions.

Forgiveness offered

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — President Corazon Aquino said Wednesday she will forgive Arturo Tolentino and soldiers who backed his brief attempt to assume the presidency if they pledge loyalty, but that she will tolerate no further rebellion.

Her executive secretary, Joker Arroyo, said sedition charges might be filed if the offer is rejected. Tolentino's passport was revoked temporarily, along with those of 24 other supporters of former President Ferdinand E. Marcos, who fled the country Feb. 26.

Ph.D.s average decade

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. universities awarded doctoral degrees in 1984 to 31,253 people who took an average of 10 years to earn their Ph.D., the National Research Council says.

New doctors of education took the longest time, 14.6 years, while physical scientists completed their studies in the least amount of time, 7.2 years.

In the fields of health sciences, psychology,

languages and literature, and education, women Ph.D.'s outnumbered the men.

In 1960, it took the average new Ph.D. 8.8 years to win the degree. That fell to a low of 7.9 years in 1970. The 10-year average in 1984 is the longest since the National Research Council began tracking new Ph.D.s in 1958.

Survivor heads home

PORTLAND (AP) — Giles Thompson, a survivor of Oregon's worst mountain-climbing accident, flashed a big smile from his wheelchair Wednesday as he left a Portland hospital and headed home to Longview, Wash.

The 16-year-old lost the lower portions of both legs following a dramatic rescue from Mount Hood on May 15. Thompson and 16-year-old Brinton Clark were the only survivors among a group of 11 climbers trapped in a snow cave on the 11,235-foot peak during a spring blizzard May 12.

DeFazio still winner

EUGENE (AP) — A recount of

votes shows that Peter DeFazio will remain the Democratic nominee in Oregon's 4th Congressional District.

The recount was ordered last

month at the request of Concerned Citizens for Western Lane County, a Florence-area group that has had a number of policy disagreements with DeFazio.

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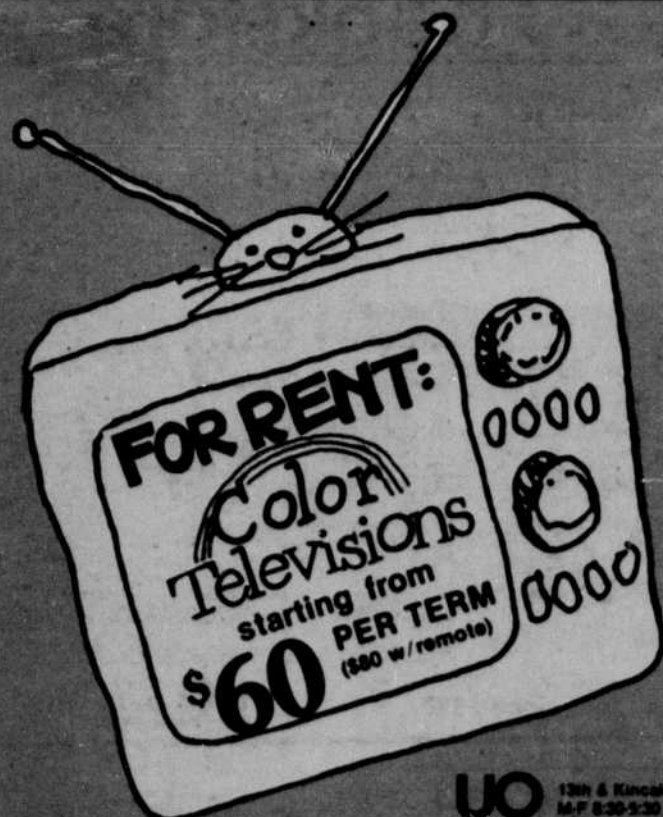
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
