Bomb kills eight

MADRID, Spain (AP) — A van rigged as a shrapnel bomb was detonated by remote control Monday as a busload of civil guards passed, killing

eight guards and wounding 44 people, including 12 civilians, officials reported.

No group claimed responsibility, but the governing Socialist Party blamed the explosion on "ETA assassins." The Basque separatist group ETA has carried out many similar attacks on military and police targets, the most recent a car bombing April 25 that killed five paramilitary civil guards.

Negotiations begin

PORTLAND (AP) — Talks aimed at settling a month-long strike by 7,500 Weyerhaeuser Co. timber workers in Oregon and Washington began Monday just hours after 30 pickets were arrested outside a company mill.

It was the first time the two sides have met since workers at 22 Washington and Oregon Weyerhaeuser mills and logging operations went on strike June 16.

Leader urges loyalty

MEDFORD (AP) — The head of the Oregon Republican Party is urging supporters of Joe Lutz to stay with the party and vote for U.S. Sen. Bob Packwood in next November's general election.

GOP Chairman Bill Moshofsky said he's asking Lutz backers to support Packwood even if they disagree with the incumbent senator on one or two major issues, such as abortion.

Group files suit

PORTLAND (AP) — A Portland-based environmental group said Monday that it has filed a lawsuit challenging the selection of the Hanford nuclear reservation in southeastern Washington as one of three potential sites for the nation's first nuclear waste dump.

The Coalition for Safe Power said it also is seeking to overturn the selection of sites in Texas and Nevada as final candidates for dumping the nation's commercial nuclear waste.

Black may be envoy

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration is considering a black businessman from North Carolina for nomination as the U.S. ambassador to South Africa, an administration source said today.

Robert Brown, 51, a public relations and management consultant from High Point, N.C., would succeed Herman Nickel, who is now on home leave.

Brown would be the first black envoy to the white-ruled country.

NASA report given

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan has received a report from NASA Director James Fletcher on meeting the recommendations of the presidential commission that probed the space program after the Challenger shuttle disaster, the White House announced Monday.

The director of the space agency was given 30 days to report to the president on how he intends to revamp the National Aeronautics and Space Administration in light of the Rogers Commission report that found organizational problems and design flaws in the space shuttle.
