International Soviet patients stable

MOSCOW (AP) — Dr. Robert Gale, the American bone-marrow transplant expert who is treating victims of the Chernobyl nuclear disaster, said

Monday the patients still hospitalized are in fairly stable condition.

"I don't think anyone is very, very ill," he said after visiting some of the 30 patients the Soviets say remain hospitalized because of the April 26 nuclear power plant accident.

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Botha warns Tutu

PRETORIA, South Africa (AP) — President P.W. Botha met with Bishop Desmond Tutu for two hours Monday about the state of emergency and warned him not to support economic sanctions against South Africa.

The black Anglican cleric said the emergency provided temporary relief without addressing the problem itself, like "an aspirin to a toothache." He compared Botha to "a good student" who could do better.

Cocaine labs sought

LA PAZ, Bolivia (AP) — U.S. military personnel and Bolivian police made two helicopter sweeps looking for cocaine laboratories Monday despite foul weather over the jungles of northeastern Bolivia, the information minister reported.

Herman Antelo said no information on results would be available until the raiding parties returned to Trinidad city, headquarters of the joint anti-drug operation.

Peres visits Hassan

RABAT, Morocco (AP) — Israeli Prime Minister Shimon Peres arrived in Morocco Monday and immediately began talks with King Hassan II, Western diplomats reported. Hassan became only the second Arab leader to meet publicly with an Israeli prime minister.

Israel and Morocco are

technically in a state of war but Hassan, who is pro-Western and a moderate Arab leader, was involved in the opening of peace contacts between Egypt and Israel.

Prince plays joke

LONDON (AP) — Prince Andrew and Sarah Ferguson rehearsed their wedding for the last time in Westminster Abbey Monday, with younger brother Prince Edward on hand with a practical joke.

To the stunned dismay of some officials waiting for the royal party at the abbey, Andrew's 22-year-old brother Edward turned up with his left arm in a sling, setting off speculation as to whether he could handle his duties as Andrew's best man.

Then someone noticed the sling had been switched to his right arm.

Reagan pressured

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, on the eve of a major policy speech on South Africa, was warned by Republican allies Monday that he must take a tougher line toward the white-minority regime in Pretoria or face the certainty Congress will enact stiff sanctions on its own.

Charges approved

PORTLAND (AP) — West Germany has approved expanded charges that accuse two former Rajneeshee leaders of crimes ranging from wiretapping to food poisoning, the U.S. Attorney's office announced Monday.

Ma Anand Sheela, former secretary to Indian guru Bhagwan Shree Rajneesh, and Ma Anand Puja, former head of the Rajneesh Medical Corp., were indicted on the charges earlier this year. An extradition treaty required that the West German government approve the charges, however, before the pair could be prosecuted.

Strike expanded

PORTLAND (AP) — Four Willamette Industries Inc. mills were shut down Monday as the International Woodworkers of America expanded its five-week-old Pacific Northwest timber strike.

Picket lines went up at 10 p.m. Sunday at two Willamette Industries mills in Sweet Home and two in Lebanon, said Don Garron, business agent for IWA Local 3-265 in Sweet Home.

The strike involves about 550 workers at the four plants and Willamette's Cascade logging and trucking divisions.
