

Work-study funds in question for ASUO program members

Work-study funds may no longer be available for paid staff of ASUO programs.

In a routine audit a few weeks ago, the question was raised whether ASUO staff members should continue receiving work-study money, said Dan Williams, vice president for administration.

Work-study money can be delegated to students who are employees of the University, Williams said. And a student whose supervisor works for the University is considered a University employee, he said.

The question is whether members of ASUO programs are considered employees, Williams said.

"It's simply a matter of inter-

pretation," he said.

But ASUO President Steve Nelson doesn't see it that way.

"The ASUO is a legitimate use for work study," he said.

If work-study funds are cut, the shortage will have to be made up with incidental fees, Nelson said.

Williams said he is unsure where the money will come from if work-study funds are cut.

Ed Vignoul, director of student financial aid, said he is "very reluctant to give much information right now," because the case is in its early stages.

"I have to question whether it is appropriate for the ASUO to be utilizing work-study funds, especially for elected officials," Vignoul said.

Peter Swan, assistant to the president for legal affairs, will

be assisting Williams in deciding the case. He declined to comment on the case.

The ASUO receives about \$100,000 annually in work-study funds to pay its employees, Nelson said. About 300 people were paid through the ASUO last fiscal year, and about 160 of those were paid through the work-study program, he said.

The University pays 20 percent of the employee's salary, and work study pays the other 80 percent, Vignoul said. The work-study program is supported by the U.S. Department of Education and is one of the Title IV financial-aid programs, he said.

Employees of all four branches of the ASUO are eligible to receive work-study benefits currently, Nelson said.
