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Paperwork slows financial aid

About 800 students will not receive their financial aid checks in time to pay tuition, said Financial Aid Director Ed Vignoul.

According to Vignoul, the students have been awarded money but have not submitted verification of their income and dependency status.

"There's no way their financial aid will be ready. They've had all summer to do it," he said.

New regulations from the U.S. Department of Education have increased the paperwork required from students as well as the work load of the University, said Jim Gilmour, associate financial aid director.

All students receiving Title IV aid are required to provide verification of income and dependency status, Gilmour said. Title IV aid includes Pell Grants, National Direct Student Loans, Guaranteed Student Loans, College Work Study and Supplemental Education Opportunity Grants.

Last year only about 50 per-

cent of Pell Grant recipients were selected for verification, Gilmour said.

"This year they've increased the number of people who have to be verified as well as the programs which require it," he said.

The new regulations require verification from 70 percent of all program recipients, Gilmour said. The financial aid directors decided to require verification from all students receiving Title IV money rather than wait for student aid reports to target individuals, he said.

"It's also fairer if you do everybody," he said. Students who receive University scholarships but no Title IV money are not subject to verification.

Verification is designed to detect fraud, not to discourage applicants or reduce the amount of financial aid awarded, Gilmour said.

"I can't believe anyone would have that intent, but I wouldn't be surprised if it had that effect," he said.

Students who submitted late verification forms, which include income tax return copies and notarized parents' signatures, may have to defer tuition or apply for a short-term loan, Vignoul said.

"Any student who is delayed — it will be by their own lack," he said. "We may have to decide that we can only give short-term loans to people in dire financial straits."

"I believe that the verification

process is indeed valid. However, I believe the Department of Education needs to cut some of the rules," Vignoul said.

Most errors are honest mistakes rather than fraud, Gilmour said.

"A very common discrepancy is for dependent students' parents to estimate their taxes wrong," he said.

He admitted that it would be possible to submit falsified returns.

"Let's face it, the only difference between a real tax form and a copy is a nickel," he said. However, he said, "If we feel someone has out-and-out lied to us, we will refer them to Student Conduct."

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
