Accused terrorist on trial

LONDON (AP) — "I hate you! I hate you!" Anne-Marie Murphy shouted at her former lover Tuesday as he stood trial accused of planting a bomb that would have killed her, their unborn child and 375 passengers on an Israeli jet.

Nezar Hindawi, a 32-year-old Jordanian, is charged with attempting to smuggle a bomb on board an El Al jetliner by planting three pounds of high explosives in Murphy's hand luggage before she boarded the Tel Aviv-bound flight at Heathrow Airport on April 17. He has pleaded innocent.

Crash survivor speaks

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — An American who survived when Sandinista soldiers shot down a cargo plane said Tuesday he is an aviation specialist who boarded the C-123 in El Salvador.

Nicaraguan officials have claimed Eugene Hasenfus, 45, of Marinette, Wis., is an American military adviser serving in El Salvador and the transport shot down Sunday in southern Nicaragua was carrying weapons and ammunition to rebels fighting the leftist Sandinistas.

Officials in Washington denied any connection between Hasenfus and the U.S. government.

Five arrested in India

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Five men from Sikh-dominated Punjab state have been arrested in connection with the attempt to assassinate Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi, the United News of India reported Tuesday.

It quoted Punjab police as saying four of the men were from the Sangrur district of southern Punjab, where Sikh extremists are fighting for an independent homeland, and the fifth was a Sikh priest from the Amritsar area.

NASA may be unrealistic

WASHINGTON (AP) — A congressional committee said Tuesday that some people in NASA may still be pushing for an unrealistic number of space shuttle flights, jeopardizing promotion of a safety-first program throughout the agency.

And, the committee said, the space agency may not have the expertise to conduct the shuttle program properly and does not yet understand how or why deficiencies in its testing program went undetected.

"The fundamental problem was poor technical decision-making over a period of several years by top NASA and contractor personnel," said the committee.

Reagan asks for unity

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan appealed directly to Congress on Tuesday to erase tough restrictions on his nuclear weapons program, arguing that his weekend summit with Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev "can only succeed if our government is united."

Two days before flying to Iceland, Reagan summoned Democratic and Republican congressional leaders to a White House breakfast to "make a special appeal" for lifting House-passed barriers to his arms buildup.

Reagan praises Orlov

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan hailed freed Soviet dissident Yuri Orlov on Tuesday as "a hero for our time" and promised to press for improvements in human rights as well as progress in arms control during the summit meeting in Iceland.

"Unless there is real Soviet movement on human rights, we'll not have the kind of political atmosphere necessary

to make lasting progress on other issues," Reagan told Orlov and a group of human rights activists in a White House meeting.

Judge says he's innocent

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal Judge Harry E. Claiborne, saying he feels like "a piece of meat that is thrown out to a couple of dogs," told his Senate impeachment trial Tuesday he did not violate federal tax law.

The convicted tax evader, depicting himself as the victim of a vendetta by vengeful prosecutors he had criticized, confidently vowed he would "continue to fight until my good name is cleared."

Claiborne said tax errors that led to his conviction were caused by hired tax preparers. "I gave them all the information I

had. They made mistakes. They made mistakes in my return," he said.

Lutz won't run

PORTLAND (AP) — Joe Lutz, who mounted a strong challenge to Sen. Bob Packwood in May's Republican primary, said Tuesday he had decided against running a write-in campaign for Packwood's seat.

Lutz, a Baptist minister who captured 43 percent of the Republican primary vote, said he instead would consider a race for Congress in 1988.

Women charged in death

KLAMATH FALLS (AP) — A 32-year-old Klamath County

woman is being held without bail on charges linking her to the August stabbing death of a paraplegic Minnesota man, authorities said Tuesday.

Debra M. Chamblee was arrested Monday near Gilchrist in central Oregon on a murder charge issued in Hibbing, Minn., according to Oregon State Police.

Chamblee is suspected of accompanying two Oregon men charged with killing Cliff Enroth of Hibbing, Minn., according to Hibbing police Chief Bill Grillo.
