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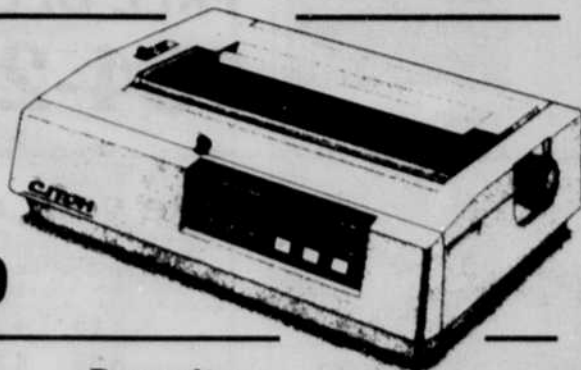
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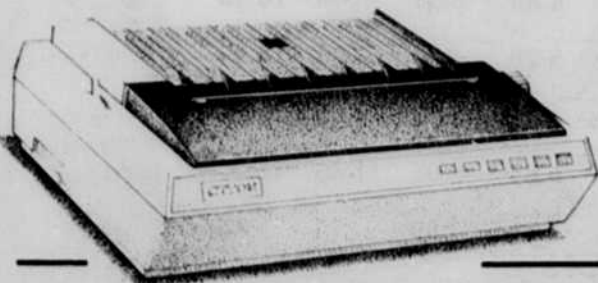

check, she said.

After he left the store, Mary called the Rape Crisis Network. A day or two later, the police were contacted, and the case eventually wound up before a grand jury.

Reynolds was not indicted, however, because he had no past history of such incidents and, Mary believes, because he was a professor.

"They believed him over me," she said.

Susan, who graduated in 1983, also remembers an incident with Reynolds, although the harassment in this case was of a more subtle nature. Susan had taken several classes in the religious studies department but only one from Reynolds. She would always run into him on campus and at the Fifth Street Public Market, however, she said.

Reynolds always seemed to exude a "real creepy, eerie lewdness," Susan said. "There was this weird sexual energy coming from him."

At first it seemed like Reynolds had a crush on her, Susan said. But it seemed to go from there into something more gross, she said.

"At first, as a woman, I thought it was something I was doing, but I realized that it wasn't me," she said. "It took me awhile to recognize it wasn't my problem."

There was one instance that Susan remembers very clearly "because of how creepy it made her feel," she said.

She had encountered Reynolds in front of the Main Library and had stopped to talk. She was wearing a slit dance skirt, black dance tights, a black scoop-neck leotard and a necklace from Thailand that dipped down into the scoop, she said.

Reynolds reached over and began fondling the necklace while talking about it at the same time, Susan said. In actuality, however, he was staring at her breasts, she said.

car when she got off work.

The situation made Kathy uncomfortable so co-workers would assist her out to her car, said James Williams, University Bookstore general manager. The police came to the store one time to question Kathy, but that was about all he knew of the situation, he said.

The harassment was stopped, but no formal charges were filed in the case.

A letter detailing the aforementioned allegations was delivered to Reynolds' attorney, James Jagger, on Oct. 10, but he did not respond to it. The Emerald made repeated at-

"When you're well-endowed, it really shows in leotards," she said.

From that day on, Reynolds was "putting out this gross sexual energy," Susan said. "When you're a woman, you kind of have an alarm system."

Another student, Yvonne Vowels, a religious studies major at the time, had taken a class from Reynolds in winter term of 1980 and felt the same way about him, she said. She would sit in the front row in class with her feet resting on a chair in front of her. On a couple of occasions, Reynolds reached down and wiggled her toes, she said.

"I got the feeling from him that if I ever went to his office I would end up having to endure some sort of sexual come-on," Vowels said. "My radar told me he was trouble so I stayed away even though I had some legitimate teacher-student sorts of questions to ask him. I never took another class from him."

The most recent known incident occurred last December and involved Kathy, a student who worked at the University Bookstore. Reynolds allegedly developed an infatuation with Kathy and would hang out in the store while she was working or would be waiting out by her

tempts by telephone up until press time to reach Jagger, both at his office and at his home, but was unable to reach him.

When Reynolds first was indicted on charges of rape and sexual abuse last April, his innocence was maintained by J.T. Sanders, the religious studies department head, said Vowels, now the graduate teaching fellow in the department.

According to Vowels, Sanders said in a private conversation with her, "I believe Professor Reynolds is innocent of the charges of sexual abuse and rape that he has been indicted for, but maybe this is his karma coming back at him for all the women he's harassed over the years."

Later in the same conversation, Sanders told Vowels about an incident that had occurred between Reynolds and a female student six or seven years earlier.

The student had been working on an interdisciplinary master's thesis, and Reynolds was on her thesis committee. To thank Reynolds for his help, this woman invited Reynolds to her apartment for dinner one night. After dinner, according to the woman's story, Reynolds

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
