that even with the modifications that were made, the continuous ring of rebar that was called for around the structure was not possible. Rebar is reinforcement steel around which concrete is poured.

"Whether you poured the wall in place...or built the concrete blocks as forms...you still would have the same problems because your steel columns and beams would cut you off. You can't run the rebar through," Karpa said.

In a letter to PGE marked "Privileged and Confidential," attorneys representing the power company said, "A review of the sections of the (Uniform Building Code) for reinforced hollow unit-masonry (the type Ali chose) immediately demonstrates that this type of construction was not intended for use when such high earthquake stresses are encountered."

The letter also says for the figures calculated at Trojan for stress, "the walls constructed at Trojan did not comply with the Uniform Building Code for masonry."

Eagon pointed out that Trojan has resident inspectors from both the Nuclear Regulatory Commission and the Oregon Department of Energy. He said these inspectors have access to every aspect of the nuclear power plant and have the power to shut down the plant if they feel an unsafe situation exists.
