National House proposes aid

WASHINGTON (AP) — House leaders on Thursday proposed a \$500 million emergency package of food, shelter and other aid to homeless Americans and said they hoped to get the money flowing by early spring.

As the bipartisan effort was being announced, protesters from the Community for Creative Non-Violence were told they and their statue

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dramatizing the plight of the homeless would be removed from the Capitol grounds.

Mitch Snyder, leader of CCNV's crusade on behalf of the homeless, and Michael Stoops, chairman of the Burnside Community Council in Portland have been sleeping outside the Capitol since Thanksgiving to draw attention to the needs of the nation's homeless.

Investigation continues

WASHINGTON (AP) — The head of the Senate committee investigating the Iran-Contra affair said his panel may have to question foreign officials, while independent counsel Lawrence Walsh was reported moving to have a grand jury get into the case.

Sen. Daniel K. Inouye, D-Hawaii, said his select committee may send investigators to Israel, Switzerland, Brunei, and possibly Iran, as part of its quest to get a complete picture of the Reagan administration's arms sales to Iran and financial dealings involving the Nicaraguan rebels.

In the House Thursday, Rep. Mel Levine, D-Calif., bemoaning "a cesspool of unaccounted-for funds," introduced legislation to cut off further U.S. aid to the Contras until the investigation is completed.

KKK members indicted

WASHINGTON (AP) — Five men identified as members of the North Carolina Ku Klux Klan and its successor group, the White Patriot Party, were indicted on charges of conspiring to obtain weapons and explosives stolen from a U.S. military installation, the Justice Department said Thursday.

An indictment issued by a federal grand jury in Raleigh, N.C., said that for 2½ years, through last fall, the men plotted to equip and train a paramilitary armed force "to further the goals of the White Supremacy Movement."

They planned a number of robberies to raise money to finance the force and plotted to kill a civil rights attorney from the Southern Poverty Law Center in Montgomery, Ala., who had sued the Carolina Klan, said the indictment.

Regional Litter tax suggested

SALEM (AP) — Rather than putting a deposit on wine coolers, the Oregon Legislature should impose a special "litter tax" on all businesses that generate trash, a beverage industry official says.

That's because wine coolers and other beverage containers make up only a very small part of litter, Paul Romain of the Oregon Beer and Wine Distributors Association said Thursday.

Under such a plan, a small assessment would be imposed on grocery stores, fast food restaurants and other businesses that generate litter, he said.

Such a tax would raise about \$1.5 million a year for litter clean-up efforts and public education campaigns, Romain said.

Oregon prison to expand

PENDLETON (AP) — The head of the Eastern Oregon State Correctional Institution says expansion of the facility could begin immediately if the Legislature's Emergency Board approves preliminary funding this week.

Bob Wright, the prison's superintendent, said he fully supports Gov.-elect Neil Goldschmidt's proposal to triple the size of the 350-inmate prison.

Hanford future debated

RICHLAND, Wash. (AP) — Hearings on the future of the N Reactor and repository studies at the Hanford nuclear reservation will be held this year, says U.S. Sen. Dan Evans, R-Wash.

The N Reactor was shut down Wednesday so that \$50 million in safety improvements — including installation of equipment to prevent a possible hydrogen explosion — could be made. Congress has cut back funding for the repository study program for 1987.

The reactor is the only one in the United States similar to the Soviet Union's Chernobyl facility that exploded last April.

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
