Military truck crashes

SALISBURY, England (AP) — A 20-ton truck, thought by anti-nuclear activists to be carrying atomic weapons, was hauled upright by a crane Sunday after skidding off an icy country road.

Soldiers, police and marines launched a security operation to recover the truck, which fell on its side Saturday in a field near a Royal Navy armament depot at West Dean, 12 miles east of Salisbury in western England.

The area was sealed off and roadblocks were set up.

The truck was towed away in a 20-vehicle convoy past a small crowd at a roadblock who included about 25 protesters shouting, "Nuclear terrorists!"

Disasters take heavy toll

ZURICH, Switzerland (AP) — An average of three major disasters a week struck the world between 1970 and 1985, killing more than 1.5 million people and leaving 50 million homeless, according to a survey by a Swiss company.

The survey listed disasters that claimed at least 20 lives or caused more than 10 million Swiss francs (\$6.2 million) in damage.

There were 2,305 such events during the period with total damages of \$700 billion, said the Swiss Reinsurance Company, which insures other insurance firms.

No breakthrough seen

WASHINGTON (AP) — Reagan administration officials said Sunday they expected no quick breakthrough following

the appointment of a top-ranking Soviet foreign ministry official as chief Kremlin negotiator to bilateral arms control talks in Geneva.

Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger said he did not believe that the appointment of Yuli Voronstov signaled an increased Soviet willingness to sign "thoroughly verifiable" deep-reduction agreements.

Secretary of State George P. Shultz said that "we are working very hard to see that the relationship with the Soviet Union progresses across the board."

Many want new policies

NEW YORK (AP) — Sixty percent of Americans hope their next president has different policies from President Reagan, according to the results of a Time magazine poll released Sunday.

Forty-one percent of those questioned said "it would be better for the country" if the next president was a Democrat, compared with 31 percent who said the next president should be a Republican.

The poll showed that 40 percent of Republicans and independents preferred George Bush as a prospective Republican candidate for president.

Among Democrats, the poll showed little change from May. In the latest findings, former

Sen. Gary Hart of Colorado was the choice of 37 percent of the Democratic and independent respondents.

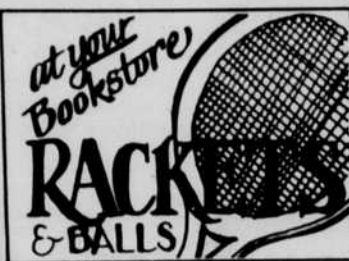
