Police question Mandela

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Police took black activist Winnie Mandela and her daughter from their home in the black township of Soweto Sunday but released them after questioning Mandela for about 5½ hours, her lawyer said.

The lawyer, Ismail Abob, said police also took a filing cabinet filled with documents belonging to Mandela. The cabinet was returned, and it did not appear that any documents had been taken, he said.

Reporters said Mandela had delivered a powerful address at a funeral in Soweto on Saturday for a member of the outlawed African National Congress guerrilla movement. Her husband, Nelson Mandela, was sentenced to life in prison in 1964 for plotting sabotage as head of the armed wing of the ANC.

Chancellor re-elected

BONN, West Germany (AP) — West German voters returned Chancellor Helmut Kohl's conservative coalition to power Sunday, but reduced their support for his Christian Democratic Party. With their Bavarian sister party, the Christian Social Union, the Christian Democrats polled 44 percent of the vote according to television predictions.

Johannes Rau, who ran for chancellor under the banner of the main opposition Social Democratic Party, conceded defeat at 7 p.m. His party received 37.6 percent of the vote.

Report cites hostages

WASHINGTON (AP) — A new draft report being prepared by the Senate Intelligence Committee on the Iran arms-Contra affair says one of President Reagan's chief motivations in approving the arms transfer was the release of U.S. hostages in Beirut, congressional sources said Sunday.

The sources, speaking on condition of anonymity, said that with the new Democratic-controlled Senate, the report will contain more details about the president's role than the report prepared last month when the panel was under the control of Republicans.

Military action advised

WASHINGTON (AP) — The chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee said Sunday that President Reagan

should consider military action in the latest kidnapping of three Americans in Beirut if the hostage-takers carry out a threat to kill the U.S. citizens.

Sen. Claiborne Pell, D-R.I., said Reagan should take "pretty hard" action against Iran if there is "clear evidence" that Iran is behind the latest kidnapping, which occurred Saturday. Both Pell and Treasury Secretary James Baker also said they think any Americans remaining in Beirut should leave.

Secretary favors study

WASHINGTON (AP) — Treasury Secretary James A. Baker III said Sunday that he is wary of Wall Street's roller-coaster performance last Friday and would favor a government study of the effects of the trend toward investments made by computer programs.

"I think that we should be concerned about excess volatility in the stock market," Baker said. "When you see a market with a range of over 100 points in the Dow as we did on Friday, I think that's a matter to be concerned about."

Baker's comments came two days after one of the wildest trading days in the history of the New York Stock Exchange.

Protesters picket clinic

PORTLAND (AP) — Abortion

protesters picketed a clinic while other demonstrators gathered downtown in a noisy show of support for a woman's right to make her own choice on the 14th anniversary of a Supreme Court decision legalizing abortion.

About 100 men, women and children marched and carried signs in front of the Lovejoy Surgicenter in northwest Portland on Thursday.

Abortion opponents have been gathering daily at the Justice Center Jail in Portland, where four persons were being held after being sentenced for contempt of court after participating in a protest at the Lovejoy Surgicenter on Saturday.

Activists spike trees

GRANTS PASS (AP) — A U.S. Forest Service spokesman says activists determined to block logging in Southern Oregon forests are "playing outside the rules" by claiming to have spiked trees.

Warren Olney, of the Siskiyou National Forest, said a letter arrived last week warning that spikes had been driven into trees on the Fox Fry timber sale.

A 4-inch long, 1¼-inch granite spike accompanied the letter. Last month, a similar letter warned of spikes driven into trees on the Hobson Horn timber sale.

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
