Student exchange program offers affordable change of environment

Although not quite as prestigious as encountering London fog or touring French wineries, the National Student Exchange Program does offer students the opportunity for exchanges at locations such as Hawaii, Massachusetts, New Jersey and Colorado. And most of those students find the experience beneficial, enjoyable — and extremely affordable.

NSEP, which originated in 1968 and offers programs at some 49 institutions, gives qualified students the opportunity to attend a different university or college and live in a different environment while paying that particular state's resident tuition rates.

Students must have attended the University for one term and have maintained a 2.5 grade point average to be eligible. Students are encouraged to apply as sophomores or juniors, but senior and graduate applicants can be cleared with the consent of the NSEP coordinator.

The University currently has 76 students on exchange, and 79 students are here from other institutions. About 1,600 are participating from other schools, including the University of Delaware, University of Puerto Rico and the University of Hawaii at Hilo. University of

Oregon, Oregon State University, University of Hawaii at Manoa and University of Massachusetts-Amherst are the program's biggest participants, according to Joseph Wade, the University's NSEP coordinator.

Wade said participating in the program involves more than looking for warm climate. He stressed that the majority of students select schools with some academic interest in mind.

"The primary motivation behind the program is to allow an institution to expand its academic curriculum," Wade said. "You can take an outstanding program like ours in psychology — we don't have much in the area of industrial psychology — and a student could go to a place like (University of) South Florida, and supplement our academic curriculum with something we don't emphasize," he said.

In reverse order, students who come to the University want the recreational opportunities this area has to offer, but most are equally concerned with academics. Many come here to take advantage of the University's nationally accredited schools, such as journalism, music and architecture, he said.

Students have been wary of

the program in the past because of concern with the cost, grading and transfer credits.

"The expense part of it is a myth I am continually working to dispel," Wade said. Some institutions have lower tuition rates than the University, so a student may spend less. Transportation to the school is usually the only extra expense, he said. Financial aid is also available through the program.

If the school has a semester system, the actual transfer rate is one and a half credits per every credit hour at the University, although Wade said it's much easier to compute if the student stays the entire year.

"The student can go fall semester at another school, and return to the University for winter and spring terms and actually end up with more credits," Wade said.

The acceptance rate for the program is very high for those who meet the requirements, although students may not get their first choice. "We work very hard with the students to help them identify institutions that we feel comfortable about placing them in," Wade said.

Rachel Kirby, a senior in fine arts and art education, came to the University as an exchange student from Illinois State University in the fall of 1984 and ended up staying.

"I first came out here mainly for the West Coast, the ocean and outdoor pursuits," she said, but after discovering the quality of the University's art education program, she decided to stay.

Christine Rapp, a junior rhetoric and communication major, returned to the University after attending West Chester State College in West Chester, Pa. last year. Rapp said she always had wanted to attend school on the East Coast, but couldn't afford it. She enrolled at the University hoping the opportunity would arise through a student exchange.

The next orientation meeting for interested students will be Feb. 27 at 4 p.m. in the EMU Forum Room. Applications will be available Feb. 1 through Feb. 13 at 164 Oregon Hall.
