

Landerholm sparks Ducks in 94-74 win at PSU

Oregon guard Lauri Landerholm scored a season-high 31 points to lead the Ducks to a 94-74 non-conference victory over Portland State University in Portland on Tuesday night.

Landerholm, who fell one point short of her career high, also collected nine rebounds, seven assists and five steals in this, the Ducks' last non-conference game of the season.

Center Gabi Neumann grabbed nine boards as well, projecting her into a fourth-place tie

with teammate Amy Pettersen on Oregon's career rebounding lists with 523 boards apiece.

Carol Drouet added 14 points and 10 assists.

The Ducks, who have averaged a game every three days this month, had a rough going early on against the Vikings, now 8-11 for the year. Although Oregon only had 13 turnovers, things were apparently so sloppy that coach Elwin Heiny pulled his starters four minutes into the game and inserted the substitutes.

"Well, we did start out OK,

but then they got lackadaisical, and I decided to try something else. The subs actually maintained the score," Heiny said.

PSU senior Stacey Liebl, who garnered 22 points, canned a free throw to give the Vikings their first and only lead of the night, 19-18. Neumann responded with a bucket for the Ducks to take back the advantage at 20-19, and they negotiated a 40-36 halftime margin.

Things did not get much better in the second half — at least not right away — but the Ducks

managed to gain a substantial lead and fend off the Vikings.

"We changed our defense to a zone, and that worked better. They did not shoot as well, and we got better rebounds as a result," Heiny said.

But PSU clawed and hung on in this one, probably thinking back to the 102-65 shellacking they received at the hands of Oregon back in November. But with the Ducks holding on to an eight-point margin with just 6:55 remaining, the Oregon defense got the better of the Vikings, and in turn reeled off 12

straight points.

"We were just wearing them down with our defense. We got some steals, good outlet passes and points off the break," Heiny said.

The Ducks have not been playing up to par lately, but they are aware of the matter. At the halfway point in the Pacific-10 Conference season, they realize that the ball is in their corner. "It's just a matter of regrouping. We're just glad to get the monkey off our back now that we've finished these non-conference games," Heiny said.

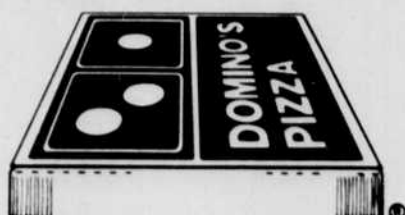
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
