

Psychology used as weapon, says visiting prof

Dr. Dov Friedlander, a visiting professor of psychology from the Hebrew University at Jerusalem, spoke yesterday about terrorism and security in Israel from a psychologist's perspective.

"It is the nature of terrorism that you must look at terrorism as a crisis content. If not, then

the terrorist has failed achieving what he set out to (achieve)," Friedlander said.

The terrorist is trying to produce a crisis situation, a sudden, subjectively unexpected event, which has an element of surprise to it.

"A clear-cut criteria of a crisis event is 'how come it happened to me?'" he said. The event also must be either earth-shaking or soul-shaking. "It has to shake the population so much that it disrupts life," and the response it gets is one of panic, he said.

"There is nothing the United States, Great Britain or Germany can do about the fact that

hostages are being taken in the streets of Beirut," Friedlander continued.

One reason people are susceptible to such a crisis event is because people learn how to cope with the predictable and deny the elements of danger and risk, Friedlander.

Going back to the 1920s, Israelis have lived in a terrorist state, yet they have learned to cope with their situation.

Israel has done a number of things which in crisis theory have been useful in giving a sense of real security to the population of Israel.

One is to give the people a feeling of being in control by reinforcing the feeling of protection within the country.

"Israelis build up a means of alertness and security which comes as a part of their everyday life," Friedlander said.

"It seems as if in Israel a significant number of the population is there to alert and protect against a terrorist attack, so the rest of the population can go about their everyday business," he explained.

A person in Israel does not feel his privacy is being invaded each time he is searched when entering a building; instead it

adds to his sense of security, he added.

In consequence, there has been a decreased amount of terrorist activities in Israel.

"In the last six months the only type of terrorist acts that have happened are stabbings with a pen knife," Friedlander said.

"What does not get reported in the U.S. press is the number of terrorist acts in Israel that are actually foiled," he attested.

Of the 900 terrorist attacks which have occurred in Israel, only 32 have actually been carried out to the full; the other 868 have been contained.

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Business zone could spur growth

City officials say Eugene's newest business recruitment tool could put the city back on the map for businesses thinking about constructing new facilities or expanding old ones.

In addition, up to 2,300 new jobs and a 2 percent decrease in property taxes citywide could come from West Eugene's enterprise zone, approved last month by state officials.

The zone is a 1,080-acre area in West Eugene that will allow new businesses developing in the area and existing businesses undergoing expansion to be exempt from paying some of their property taxes for a five-year period.

Lee Beyer, the city's industrial development manager, said he has received from one to three inquiries a week about the zone since officials started talking about it last fall. When promotion efforts begin next

month, Beyer expects to field even more calls.

When the zone first was approved, Beyer said he expected most of the interest to be from businesses outside the Eugene/Springfield metropolitan area. But much of the initial interest is coming from businesses already located within the zone that are thinking of expansion.

Several firms in the area may speed up their expansion plans because of the zone, Beyer said.

To be eligible for the tax exemption, 60 percent of the firm's employees must live within the zone, and 40 percent of them must be economically disadvantaged.

Eligible firms pay no property taxes the first year, 20 percent of their property taxes the second year, 40 percent the third year, 60 percent the fourth year, 80 percent the fifth year and the full amount from the sixth year on.

About 30 states have enterprise zones. One study found that enterprise zones generated about \$6.6 billion in new investment and about 80,000 jobs nationwide, said Norm Solomon, manager of the state's enterprise zone program.

Twenty regions in the state have enterprise zones, and preliminary studies show eight to 10 of the zones were successful last year in attracting new investors, Solomon said.

One of the biggest investments is the Nippon Kokan K.K. company in Millersburg, which will construct a \$50 million silicon plant in part because of Albany's enterprise zone.

"In the state of Oregon, we don't have that many incentives," said Rosemary Pryor, information coordinator for the Eugene Development Department. "This is just one more recruitment tool."
