Donations up

Supporters gave the University about \$9.1 million last year, more than a \$4 million increase from the previous year, according to the University Foundation in its 1986 annual report.

The year-end report shows an increase both in the number of givers and in the size of gifts. The overall total is 79 percent higher than recorded in 1985, according to Clifton Cole, acting executive director for the foundation.

Among the non-cash gifts received by the University in 1986 were an Arabian stallion, an "antique" mahogany 19-foot Chris Craft Capri, a share of two Portland warehouses, two pieces of prime property in the West 11th Avenue economic development area and a new

FM radio station in Bend.

Bunk beds obtained

Students requests have prompted the University Housing Department to purchase bunk bed/loft units. A temporary rule allowing the department to rent the units to housing residents for the remainder of the academic year became effective Jan. 1.

Next year, the units will become standard equipment with the cost incorporated into room and board rates.

The bunk bed/loft units cost \$127 each, have an estimated life of seven years and are rented to dormitory residents for \$15 a term.

Rental fee increased

A temporary rule has increased the basic rental fee charged

for the use of McArthur Court from \$500 to \$1,000, effective Jan. 1. The amendment affects University groups scheduling major events with an attendance of 2,500 persons or more at McArthur Court.

The Athletic Department found the former \$500 rental fee plus direct expenses failed to cover department planning and overhead costs.

Cards to be replaced

The card catalog at the Eugene Public Library will be removed Feb. 14. Public-access computer terminals, on-line since August 1984, then will be the sole means of researching library materials. Library administrators estimate \$30,000 is saved each year by eliminating manual updates of the card catalog.

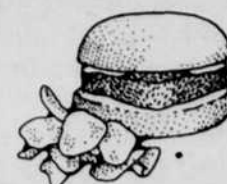
