

IFC grants Sister University Project money

The Incidental Fee Committee Tuesday voted to give the Sister University Project \$1,110 for its 1987-88 budget but only after one committee member questioned the validity of the Sister University Project.

The group had requested a budget of \$1,575, but because it is still applying for EMU office space and hadn't yet received any, the committee said \$500 requested for a telephone hook-

up and a watts line could not be approved.

Jodie Mooney, IFC chairwoman, suggested that as soon as they obtain office space the group should return to the IFC with a special request for those funds.

The group's political goals and leanings were brought into question by committee member Ron Munion, who cited examples of members of the group attending rallies that called for resignations of individuals in

political offices. Other group members had accused the United States of "wrongful activities" in El Salvador last summer, he said.

"The past history of this organization is political and does not meet the statutory requirements necessary to get funding," Munion charged.

The group defended these activities by calling them "cultural expression."

But committee member Bob Baldwin countered the argument, saying that the group does not advocate political agendas and does "provide for the cultural advancement of students on this campus."

He added that the group's purpose in going to El Salvador earlier this year was to learn about the University of El Salvador and the culture of the country.

To do this, members of the Sister University Project necessarily had to become involved in the activities of the people of that country.

The ASUO Executive recommendation was to accept the stated goals of the group as written, and the IFC voted 3-1 with Munion opposed to accept the group's goals.

Committee members Katy Howard and Lauri Clark were not present. Committee member James Randall submitted his resignation from the IFC Tuesday.

The Masters in Business Administration Association, represented by Don Morrison and Wendy Dane, was given \$1,373 for its 1987-88 budget by the committee. The group, which did not seek funding last year because it was in a restructuring stage, asked for \$1,893.

A vote on each line of the budget was taken after committee members clashed on several points of the budget, including money for a watts line and for the printing and mailing of resumes.

After the vote, a calculation error was discovered that gave the group more money than the committee had allocated. Another vote will be taken at the next meeting to correct the error.

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\$24,000 in incidental fee money," he said. "Apparently, the state can not give \$24,000 to a non-profit corporation."

The IFC loan was intended to cover the food store's merchandise, rent and general operation costs, said Nelson in an article in the Aug. 14, 1986 Oregon Daily Emerald.

The solution was to make the food store an ASUO program and set it up like the insurance program, he said.

"The food store employees would be employed by SPI," he said. "Like the insurance program, there would be a food store committee who would be responsible for making deci-

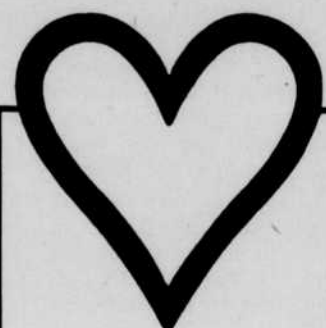
