Royal palace attacked

LONDON (AP) — A man attacked two officers with a knife and hammer in the Kensington Palace garden early Wednesday, but did not get inside where Prince Charles, Princess Diana and other members of the royal family slept, police said. The masked intruder was tackled and handcuffed before he could breach the wall around the palace. The policemen suffered minor injuries.

Scotland Yard said Bela Mark Stifter, a 27-year-old unemployed man from Reading, was charged with being equipped for theft and causing bodily harm to the two policemen. Buckingham Palace said the Prince and Princess of Wales and their two sons, Prince and Princess Michael of Kent, and the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester were in their apartments when the incident occurred at about 1 a.m.

Reagan answers queries

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan answered questions from an investigatory board about the Iran arms-sale affair on Wednesday, as the White House defended Reagan's refusal to order two key figures in the case to testify.

Reagan met in the Oval Office with members of the review board headed by former Sen. John Tower, R-Texas.

At the request of the board, Reagan granted a one-week extension, until Feb. 26, for the panel to submit its final report. The report originally was due Jan. 29, but the board was granted an earlier delay until Feb. 19.

McFarlane 'picked on'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Robert C. McFarlane, the former presidential aide who is

recovering from a drug overdose, has been picked on unfairly because he's the only key figure cooperating in the investigations of the sale of U.S. weapons to Iran, his lawyer said Wednesday. "He's the only game in town for the press to write about and some members of Congress to complain about," attorney Leonard Garment said, noting that his client — unlike other important players — volunteered to testify on Capitol Hill and elsewhere.

Bush begins campaign

LANSING, Mich. (AP) — Vice President George Bush praised the economic and foreign policy accomplishments of "this Republican administration" on Wednesday night as he embarked on a series of political forays to protect his standing as frontrunner for the 1988 Republican presidential nomination.

But in remarks distributed in advance of a dinner with Republican party faithful, Bush made no reference to the Iran-Contra controversy that has befallen the Reagan's administration and coincided with a dip in his own political strength.

County nixes nuke game

ASTORIA (AP) — Clatsop County commissioners decided Wednesday to stage a natural disaster preparedness drill rather than a mock nuclear war exercise planned by the federal government, even if it costs the county more than \$12,000 in federal emergency planning funds. The Federal Emergency Management Agency has scheduled the nuclear war drill for March 3-5.

On Feb. 4, the three county commissioners voted unanimously to boycott the nuclear war drill in a resolution that said the county "vehement-

ly protests" the war planning. At a meeting with state and federal officials on Feb. 5 in Salem, the county commissioners proposed their plan to rehearse for a natural disaster, such a flood, tsunami or accident at the Trojan nuclear power plant.

Vehicle bill called vague

SALEM (AP) — A bill calling for the state to confiscate the vehicles of uninsured motorists or people caught driving with suspended licenses is too vague, the Oregon House Judiciary Committee was told Wednesday. "Generally speaking, I think the bill is a good idea, but it's just not well thought out," said Mark McDonald of Gov. Neil Goldschmidt's task force on drunken driving.

Rep. Rick Kotulski, D-Corbett, sponsor of HB2389, said a large percentage of accidents are caused by people who should not be driving because they have no insurance or their licenses have been suspended or revoked. Vinita Howard of the state Motor Vehicles Division estimated that more than 49,000 vehicles a year could be confiscated under the bill.

Survival proposal aired

SALEM (AP) — State Rep. Shirley Gold plans to propose a constitutional amendment that would guarantee all Oregonians food, shelter, clothing and medical care. The Portland Democrat said Wednesday that the proposal will state that all Oregonians should be guaranteed the basics for survival.

But she said it wouldn't necessarily mean spending more money on welfare programs. "We need an orderly directive from the people of Oregon on how to prioritize among many programs vying for our attention," Gold said. The proposed amendment

would guarantee all citizens an equal right to the basics they need to survive. Gold said.

Senate OKs primary bill

SALEM (AP) — The Oregon Senate on Wednesday unanimously passed a bill that would make Oregon part of a Pacific Northwest regional presidential primary election if one is established. The measure, SB179, went to the House without debate.

The bill would move Oregon's presidential primary

from the third Tuesday in May to the fourth Tuesday in March, but only if at least two other Northwest states established presidential primaries on the same date. The states designated in the measure are Washington, Alaska, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming. Secretary of State Barbara Roberts, the leading advocate for the measure, said the change could focus some national attention on Northwest states that otherwise are largely overlooked during presidential campaigns.
