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Symposium focuses on awareness of rape and its effects on society

Educating people about rape and its effects on society is one of the purposes of this week's Rape Awareness Symposium.

The symposium, which will run today through Thursday, will present a series of films related to rape, as well as discussions and demonstrations. It will conclude on Thursday night with the annual "Take Back The Night March."

"The purpose of the week is to make men and women aware rape is an issue for all people, not just women. It is a social issue and everyone needs to be able to speak about it openly," said Heather Mactaggart, ASUO Women's Task Force Coordinator.

"We also want people to realize rape is not something to be ashamed or embarrassed about and that victims of rape should come forward for help," she added.

It is important that University students are aware of rape since University women are in the high risk category as potential rape victims. "Women need to be aware of the resources available in the community as well as on campus," Mactaggart said.

"Many women are not sure what they can do about rape, but there is always something to do: One way to know what to do is by discussing it with others," Mactaggart said.

Society's attitude toward rape is becoming more tolerant. "More courts are not blaming the victims of rape," Mactaggart said.

"Rape: Myths and Facts" is the title of the first day of the symposium, which includes an anti-pornography slide show called "Women Against Violence Against Women."

The second day of the symposium is titled "Surviving

Rape." A film which depicts rape prevention by examining the cycle of rape — the personal trauma, societal reactions and the treatment of the victim — will be shown.

The "Take Back the Night March," which will start at the EMU Courtyard Feb. 19 at 8:15 p.m., is now a tradition in cities around the country. The first "Take Back the Night March" was held nine years ago in San Francisco.

"The march symbolizes that women can walk in the streets together and feel safe, but can't walk alone and feel safe," said Mary Sullivan from the Women's Resource and Referral Service. "We are taking back a space that should be ours anyway."

The symposium is co-sponsored by the ASUO, Women's Resource and Referral, Men Against Rape, Rape Crisis Network and Catalyst Films.

BSU receives IFC funds after debate

The Incidental Fee Committee allocated a total of \$77,177 to four organizations Monday:

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the Philosophy Club, the American Society of Interior Design, the Black Student Union and Recreation and Intramurals.

The hearing for the Black Student Union lasted over an hour because of extended discussion over expenses surrounding the BSU's Black Leadership Commemoration and the Black Arts Festival. The BSU received \$2,000 of its \$2,500 request for the Leadership Commemoration and its total \$2,000 request for the Black Arts Festival.

The argument for funding the organization as requested was spearheaded by IFC member Bob Baldwin, who stressed the important role of the BSU in the cultural integration of the University and the community.

IFC members Ron Munion and Laurie Clark said the IFC should be more cautious in the money it allocates and maintain the IFC's goal of maintaining current incidental fees.

The entire BSU request was \$10,952. The IFC allocated \$10,409 in line item votes rather than voting the entire budget at once.

During the course of the debate, Baldwin said he believed Munion's reluctance to give the BSU their entire budget request stemmed from racist attitudes.

Baldwin said opposition to the BSU request was coming from someone who agreed with racial segregation in Georgia.

Munion did not comment immediately on the allegation and Katy Howard, acting IFC Chairperson said she didn't want personal politics to be brought up during the budget hearings.

"The whole comment was baseless, absurd and classical Bob Baldwin," Munion said. "I did not propose a decrease in last year's budget, and when I look at a budget, I try to see if the group necessarily needs that money."

The Philosophy Club, a new organization, received \$645 of its \$853 request.

The IFC unanimously approved the requested \$491 budget of the American Society of Interior Design.

The IFC approved the \$65,462 request of Recreation and Intramural.

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
