

Ducks rely on in-state crop for letter-of-intent signees

Oregon football coach Rich Brooks and his staff once again turned primarily to in-state high school football recruits for the recent 1987 National Letter-of-Intent period.

The Ducks have signed four college transfers and 21 high school seniors — 13 from Oregon — to scholarships.

"We're really excited about the in-state players," Brooks said. "A lot of them didn't receive high notoriety and weren't highly recruited — which makes it all the better for us in my opinion."

While going for the best football players in Oregon, Brooks is adding to a squad which already consists of a large number of Oregon natives.

On the 1986 squad, there were 38 players from Oregon — 14 were starters. This year's crop looks to extend "The Oregon Connection" even further.

As well as aiming at the in-state crop of high school players, Oregon has placed a strong emphasis on rebuilding the defense. Seventeen of the

"It shouldn't be surprising for anyone who has seen us play the last couple of years," Brooks said of the emphasis on defensive recruits. "There isn't much returning depth in that area."

Safety Anthony Newman is the only starter in the Ducks' secondary who will return next

Gould was ticketed for starting duty in his first year at Wichita State, before suffering a hamstring injury that affected his entire season. When Gould was healthy he played extremely well, according to Brooks, who said (Gould) is going to be a major factor on next year's team.
