Inmate identifies guard

JERUSALEM (AP) — An inmate who shaved women's heads before they were gassed at Treblinka testified Wednesday that John Demjanjuk was the guard "Ivan the Terrible." Gustav Boraks, an 85-year-old native of Poland, said he recognized photographs of the former Ohio auto worker as Ivan because the guard "had a full face, a high forehead and small eyes."

On Tuesday, 60-year-old survivor Josef Czarny also identified Demjanjuk as the Ukrainian guard through a photograph, but he said Ivan had large eyes.

Four witnesses now have identified the 66-year-old defendant as Ivan.

Demjanjuk was born in the Soviet Ukraine. He is accused of being the sadistic guard who gouged out eyes, beat and stabbed prisoners, shoved them into the death chambers and turned on the gas.

Negotiators offer treaty

GENEVA (AP) — U.S. arms negotiators offered a draft treaty Wednesday for removing medium-range nuclear weapons from Europe and challenged the Soviets to agree on eliminating them worldwide. The American presentation, ordered by President Reagan, came on what was to have been the last day in the seventh round of the U.S.-Soviet arms talks that began two years ago.

U.S. spokesman Terry Shroeder said teams dealing with medium-range missiles would continue meeting indefinitely. Maynard Glitman, who leads the U.S. team on medium-range arms, said the American proposal embodies tentative agreements reached at the summit with Soviet leader Gorbachev in Iceland last October. He said those included a limit of 100 warheads deployed on the territory of each superpower.

Israeli leader apologizes

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Defense Minister Yitzhak Rabin on Thursday apologized to the American government and people for the Pollard spy affair.

Jonathan J. Pollard, 32, a former U.S. Navy intelligence analyst, pleaded guilty to spying for Israel, and Wednesday was sentenced to life imprisonment by a Washington court. His wife, Anne Henderson-Pollard, was given five years for helping him. Pollard, who said he spied for ideological reasons, said high government officials in Israel knew of his spying. But Israeli officials have said Pollard's activities were not known to Israeli leaders.

Rabin called the Pollard affair "a very sad and unfortunate incident... It was an exception, a unique exception... It was done without the knowledge of the political authority."

Life sentence meted out

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former civilian Navy intelligence analyst Jonathan Jay Pollard was sentenced Wednesday to life in prison for selling Israel hundreds of secret U.S. military documents in what prosecutors termed one of the nation's worst spy cases.

His wife, Anne-Henderson Pollard, received a five-year prison term for conspiring to receive embezzled government property and being an accessory after the fact to possession of defense secrets.

Federal prosecutors said Pollard gave Israel thousands of pages of classified documents, which could fill a room the size of a large closet.

House OKs homeless bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Democratic-controlled House, overcoming minor Republican opposition, passed legislation Thursday authorizing \$500 million in emergency aid to assist the nation's homeless this year. The 264-121 vote came on a bill, introduced by the House Democratic Leadership, to provide emergency food and shelter, transitional housing, outpatient health services and conversion of surplus buildings.

The House approved the measure after killing an amendment by House Republican leader Robert H. Michel of Illinois which would have required that the funds come from

already appropriated monies. The Michel amendment, which was modified by Rep. Barney Frank, D-Mass., to require the money to come from foreign aid programs, failed 207-203.

State told to participate

BOTHELL (AP) — Oregon state officials, who withdrew last month from a federal nuclear attack drill, have been told to reverse the decision or face a cutoff of civil defense funds. In a March 3 letter to Gov. Neil Goldschmidt, William H. Mayer, regional director of the Federal Emergency Management, repeated an earlier warning to Washington Gov. Booth Gardner, who also rejected participation in the drill.

The letter to Goldschmidt, released Wednesday, said that unless Oregon officials agree to reschedule the exercise so it can be completed before June 30, Mayer would move to withdraw from the state more than \$1 million in civil defense funds, about half of which go to state agencies and the rest to local emergency management programs.

Students rally for belts

SALEM (AP) — About 200 high school students from around the state staged a rally on the front steps of the State Capitol on Wednesday to show their support for a mandatory seat belt law. Speakers at the rally, sponsored by a group called Oregon Student Safety on the Move, said requiring drivers and passengers to buckle up would save lives and money.

Also on hand for the rally were several members of the Oregon Senate, which approved a mandatory seat belt bill last

week. Under the bill, which is awaiting a vote in the House, drivers and their passengers could be fined up to \$50 for failing to buckle up. Current law already requires juveniles 15 and under to wear seat belts.

Poll: Levies acceptable

SALEM (AP) — A poll indicates two out of three Oregonians would allow school districts to collect the prior year's property tax levy without voter approval, according to Gov. Neil Goldschmidt's office. The office released results

Wednesday of a statewide poll on elements of a "safety net" school tax measure being considered by the Legislature.

According to the survey, 68 percent would give school districts the power to impose previous levies without a vote. But 70 percent would oppose any plan allowing automatic increases in tax levies without elections. Asked about school spending, 42 percent of those polled said it is about right, 27 percent said it's too high and 21 percent said it's too low. The privately financed poll has a margin of error of plus or minus 4.4 percent.

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
