

Williams received a 24 percent raise of \$12,500 in July 1985, and an 8 percent raise of \$5,000 in July 1986. Overall, Williams' \$17,500 increase equalled a 33 percent raise in two years.

"In order to bring him up to a normal vice president's salary, he got what looked like a huge increase," Olum said. "But in fact it only brought him up to an average vice president's salary."

"Apart from that, all the cases of people here were more or less in line with what the faculty got," he said.

Williams high percentage pay raise in the first year of the biennium, pushed the average administrative pay increase to nearly 20 percent at the University that year, said Ralph Sunderland, director of management and budget.

But in the second year of the biennium, University administrators' pay raises averaged 8.8 percent, Sunderland said.

Olum and the presidents of Portland State University and Oregon State University received \$13,870 increases over the

two-year period, averaging 9 percent a year. They now earn \$86,400 a year.

The presidents at Oregon's three regional colleges and the Oregon Institute of Technology received pay increases of \$14,844 over two years, averaging 12.5 percent a year. They now earn \$72,000 a year.

The highest paid State System official, Oregon Health Sciences University President Leonard Laster, received a two-year pay raise from \$89,136 to \$104,160 a year, for an average raise of 8 percent a year during

the biennium.

William Davis, chancellor of the State System, received a two-year increase of \$17,040, for an average raise of 10.5 percent a year. Davis earns \$92,040 a year.

Bill Lemman, executive vice chancellor of the State System, received a two-year pay raise of \$14,340, for an average increase of 11 percent a year. Lemman now makes \$75,840 a year.

A 1985-86 study from the University of Arkansas showed the average salary of presidents at public universities across the

nation was \$87,599, while presidents at Oregon's public universities earned an average of \$79,800 the same year.

The average faculty salary at the University in 1985-86 was \$31,300. That salary ranked 97th out of 109 public, doctorate-granting universities in the country, according to a State System list.

think that maybe Eugene's not as progressive as we like to think it is."

The FEMA exercises "violate the spirit of Lane County's nuclear-free zone ordinance," Bowers said. Ordinances establishing the zones in Eugene and Lane County were adopted by voters in last November's general election. The ordinances prohibit civil defense preparation throughout the county.

Despite Goldschmidt's decision, which overrides individual county decisions, Bowers said she thinks Lane County commissioners "should respond to the will of the voters."

Olum spent barely five minutes at the microphone, but "painted a really vivid picture of the nuclear scene," one bystander commented.

Referring to FEMA's exercises as "insanity," Olum said the destruction from any kind of nuclear attack would leave little for anyone to do for the sake of survival.

Olum, one of the physicists who contributed to the Manhattan Project, termed the 17,000-ton TNT-equivalent bomb the U.S. dropped on Hiroshima during World War II "a Model-T compared with the super-sonic jets of today." The tens of thousands of nuclear warheads the U.S. and U.S.S.R. currently have in store "dwarf the one dropped on Hiroshima," Olum said.

Another speaker, Dr. Sarah Hendrickson of Physicians for Social Responsibility, thanked members of the crowd who phoned and wrote Goldschmidt to urge his decision on the FEMA drills.

"We've won one — it feels really good," Hendrickson said.

Other speakers at the rally included Rabbi Myron Kinberg and the Rev. Tom Heger.
