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Morse Chair appointee to speak

Charles Black, a Columbia University law professor and author of 20 books on both law and poetry, will give a series of seminars and lectures at the University as the 1987 occupant of the Wayne Morse Chair of Law and Politics.

The purpose of the Wayne Morse Chair, which is named after the late Oregon senator and University law school dean who died in 1974, is to bring a distinguished scholar to the

University for a week or two to lecture about subjects in the fields of public affairs and law, which were Morse's main interests and areas in which he worked, said Emory Via, director of the Labor Education and Research Center.

The program is in its sixth year of existence.

"This year there was special interest in assisting with the University's all-over celebration of the bicentennial of the U.S. constitution," Via said.

"Part of what the University

is doing for the bicentennial of the constitution is something apart from just flag waving and standing up and saluting that great document," Via said. "We are going to look at the constitution and talk about what it is, what it has done and where it is going."

Black, 71, has spent most of his academic career at Yale University School of Law. He has written about and worked in the fields of constitutional and admiralty law, and he also has written several books concerning capital punishment.

During the "Brown vs. Board of Education" desegregation case, Black was a member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People legal defense fund staff. During the case, various attorneys and scholars were pooled together to discuss the case and to go over various sociological findings relating to the case. Black also wrote various drafts of briefs relating to the case, Via said.

While Black's main field of expertise is constitutional and admiralty law, he also has been widely acclaimed as a poet. In fact, he calls himself primarily a poet. Black has had three volumes of his poetry published, Via said.

Previous occupants of the Morse Chair include Fred Friendly (1985), the originator and executive producer of "CBS Reports"; Shirley Hufstедler (1984), former federal judge and U.S. Secretary of Education; Anthony Lewis (1983), author and editorial columnist for the New York Times; Philip Klutznick (1981), Deputy Ambassador to the United Nations and former U.S. Secretary of Commerce; and Willard Wirtz (1980), former U.S. Secretary of Labor.

Black will present a lecture titled "Reflections on Teaching and Working in Constitutional Law" on Wednesday, March 11 in the Composers Hall of the Eugene Community Conference Center.



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Dinosaurs

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The WISTEC display is part of a total of twelve different prehistoric creatures touring the country. Currently, WISTEC has on display an edaphosaurus, or "ground lizard"; a tyrannosaurus, or "tyrant lizard"; brontosaurus, or "deceptive lizard"; stegosaurus or "roof lizard"; triceratops, or "three-horned face"; and a dinosaur bird.

The exhibit is a good learning experience, Vollom said. "Having something tangible is good. This is a 3-D experience. People tend to remember things better when they actually see them."

Between 50,000 and 60,000 people are expected to visit the display, Vollom said.

In addition to the dinosaur models, there is an activity room where visitors can make their own dinosaur cartoon. A series of pictures are drawn on a long strip of paper and then put into either a zoetrope, a drum with slits, or a praxinoscope, a drum with a central column of mirrors to reflect the images. The drums are then spun to give a motion effect. This activity was made by Jill Macdonald and Jean Alseth, both interns from the University.
