

specifics of the case, he said it "revolves around academic dishonesty."

"The law school turned it over to the police in early February to find out if it violated any criminal code. The determination was made at some point, based upon information, that there were violations," Tilby said.

No action has been taken by the University law school to date, according to law school Dean Maurice Holland. To Holland's knowledge, Bils still is enrolled in the school, and disciplinary action taken will depend on "what transpires in criminal proceedings and how

it (the case) is concluded," Holland said.

Bils may have violated the second offense under the University Student Conduct Code, which sanctions disciplinary action against students found guilty of committing "forgery, alteration or unauthorized use of University documents, records, keys, student identification or key cards."

University conduct codes are independent of all county and state criminal codes.

Bils would neither confirm nor deny the arrest. "I don't know what you're talking about... I'm going to have to look into what's going on," Bils said.

A Eugene teachers' strike has become a real possibility in recent weeks after the teachers' union rejected a fact finder's report and entered a 30-day, pre-strike waiting period required by the state Employee Relations Board. After the

30-day period, the union can legally announce a strike that could begin about April 15.

The EEA and the Eugene School Board have been unable to reach a contract agreement after more than a year of negotiations, and both sides admit a strike is likely.

Directors, and has been involved in elective politics since her freshman year when she first ran for the EMU position on the Students for a Progressive Agenda ticket.

One aspect of the CSRL philosophy is equal representation for all students, Sauerwein said.

"We come not from the far right or the far left, but from a coalition belief that all students should have their interests equally represented by the government, and the student government should represent each individual student's interests as much as any other student's," he said.

CSRL also wants to see student government's focus shift back to the immediate campus, Brooks said.

"I am personally concerned that the focus of student government on this campus has digressed towards the emphasis of international/political issues at the expense of campus and student-based concerns," she said.

However, this does not mean they think student government should completely shut itself off from the outside world, Gaffney said.

Issues CSRL is focusing on range from equity in incidental fee funding to child care, Sauerwein said. The group also mentioned health insurance, parking and campus safety as pro-

blem areas that need to be improved.

CSRL does not want to present itself as being "anti-SPA," Sauerwein said. CSRL wants to run a positive campaign open to student input, he said.

The group is currently screening candidates for other ASUO positions, Gaffney said.

terests, but that's not true, Hoffman said.

"The altruistic and idealistic feeling remained throughout the whole decade," he said.

Although student movements are growing today, there lacks a counterculture that was present in the '60s, he said. And it is up to the young people to discover a new counterculture, Hoffman said.

Nationwide student protests to bar CIA recruiters from campuses parallel the Vietnam War protests of the '60s, Hoffman said.

"Once a student starts to fight for someone else's freedom, a strange thing happens: They start looking at their own situation," he said.

But in order to fight for and institute change, the battle has to be carried out on the streets and by grass-roots organizations, Hoffman said. This happened in the '60s and needs to develop today, he said.

American colleges are "ivory towers" where young people go to think about their career and marriage: "yuppie training camps," Hoffman called them.

But to bring about future reforms, students must work against that image, he said.

"You try changing that image so that students actually see themselves as citizens with rights to participate in the decision-making process to control the campus newspapers, to bring tuition rates down, get minority programs (and) lower the voting age," he said.

Hoffman, who turned 50 this year, is still fighting for what he believes in. Next month he, Amy Carter and others who participated in an anti-CIA demonstration at the University of Massachusetts go on trial. Hoffman intends to show that the CIA is an illegal operation at the trial.

"I am not a critic, I am an activist," he said. "I am going after the CIA in court to prove before an American jury in North Hampton the CIA is an illegal organization," Hoffman said.

"We feel very confident. We are the 3-1 favorites, bookies in Massachusetts tell us."

And in four months, Hoffman plans to file a suit against the

U.S. Army for false advertising, he said.

"You do not learn brain surgery and superelectronics in the Army, as they say on TV. You learn how to clean toilets and how to kill people in the U.S. Army," Hoffman said.

On April 25 and 26, Hoffman will participate in a demonstration in Washington, D.C., to protest U.S. policy in Central America. A quarter of a million people are expected to attend.

"It is an unwarranted invasion of privacy and is degrading," Thoma said.

Student Senator Cory Wynne agreed. "It attempts to cure symptoms with no address to the underlying cause," Wynne said.

Wynne proposed that the Athletic Department institute the Impact Training Program in an education program. Impact creates a family atmosphere where individuals can talk about their lives and the role drugs play in them.

"Impact creates an attitude that it is OK to say 'No' to drugs. It has long-lasting effects," Wynne said.

However, a number of University athletes at the meeting opposed using Impact in the Athletic Department.

Helen Zech of the tennis team said people are misinformed about the random drug-testing policy. "It increases the integrity of competition, the health and safety of the athletes, and the deference of substance use," she said.

Harold Kuphaldt of the track and cross country teams said alternatives to the current policy are not practical or effective. It is also unrealistic to think a coach can recognize athletes who have problems, he said.

"The current policy works. It's like a pop quiz. If you do what you're supposed to, it will be fine," Kuphaldt said.
