Pope visits Chile

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — Pope John Paul II called for the victory of peace over violence as he arrived Wednesday in this nation he has called "dictatorial." Police used tear gas to disperse crowds pushing toward him.

President Augusto Pinochet, the leader of Chile's right-wing military regime, met the pontiff at the airport and told him the country is a victim of a foreign campaign of "hate, lies and the culture of death."

"God bless Chile," the pope said, declaring he wanted Chile to work for "forgiveness and reconciliation, with the victory of good over evil, peace over

violence."

Senate sustains veto

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate tentatively sustained President Reagan's veto of an \$88 billion highway bill on a 65-35 vote on Wednesday, handing him a tenuous victory in a high-stakes political showdown with the Democratic majorities.

Oregon's senators sided with President Reagan. Sens. Mark Hatfield and Bob Packwood were among 33 Republicans who voted to sustain the veto.

A total of 65 senators voted to override the veto, two short of the two-thirds majority necessary to pass the legislation over the president's opposition.

Democratic leaders in the

Senate were attempting to arrange a second vote on the issue.

U.S., Japan plan talks

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration, while standing fast to its plans for sanctions on Japanese electronics imports, has agreed to a Japanese request for "emergency consultations" in the intensifying dispute over computer chips.

A team of Japanese trade specialists will arrive in Washington on Friday for negotiations with their counterparts in the departments of State, Commerce and office of U.S. trade representative, officials said.

However, U.S. officials held out little hope that the dispute

over semiconductor pricing practices could be resolved in time to avert the proposed duties on \$300 million in Japanese products from taking effect on April 17.

Students removed

PORTLAND (AP) — Police removed 10 students Wednesday from a Reed College building they had occupied for more than two days in a protest over the school's investments in companies doing business in South Africa.

The students were arrested on trespassing charges and released on their own recognizance.

Susan Crim, dean of students, contacted the 11 students who

were occupying the building at 11 p.m. Tuesday and told them the university would rescind its decision to suspend them if they agreed to leave the building.

Group demands plans

GRANTS PASS (AP) — About 45 people from the radical environmental group, Earth First, gathered at the headquarters of the Siskiyou National Forest on Wednesday to demand the release of a draft of the forest's 10-year management plan.

Though the plan had been expected to be available to the public last fall, an appeal by the timber industry has delayed the release until at least July, said forest spokesman Warren Olney.
