Unidentified group distributes controversial anti-gay tracts

Three men who refused to identify themselves sparked debate Wednesday while distributing a pamphlet entitled the "The Gay Plague; Homosexuality and Disease" in the EMU courtyard.

Printed in 1983, the leaflet listed several statistics about what it called the "truth about homosexuality and the public health." Statistics were grouped into subjects titled "Gay Sex," "Gay Disease," "AIDS," "Gay Psychology" and "The Gay Game Plan." The leaflet listed a group called Alert Citizens of Texas as its sponsor.

The pamphlet claimed "In gay baths, gays usually have sex with between 10 and 30 anonymous sexual partners each night," "Gays demand the right to have public sex" and "Gays are 20 times more apt to molest children than heterosexuals." The pamphlet also made many references correlating homosexuals and AIDS.

One of the distributors, a middle-aged man described by his partners as their spokesman, said the pamphlet's sources are physicians in Texas who got "together because they believe people should hear the facts about homosexuals."

"I don't believe students are aware, and in order to become aware, they should read this pamphlet," he added.

But Mike Kennedy, a member of the Gay and Lesbian Alliance's board of directors, said one of the most listed sources in the pamphlet, Dr. Paul Cameron, actually holds a Ph.D. in theology and is a member of the 700 Club, a Christian organization.

"He is no expert on these issues," Kennedy said.

"It is inaccurate and hurtful to assume that all gays are promiscuous or have AIDS. Gays don't cause AIDS, occurrence of this tragic disease is a biological event, not a moral comment," Kennedy said.

And Wednesday was not the first time these pamphlets were distributed on campus, Kenne-

day said. The pamphlets have been seen on at least two previous occasions, he said.

Cassie Gage, a senior at the University, was present at the distribution.

"I think this is terrifying and scary. It is possibly one of the least compassionate things I've seen. I'm concerned about AIDS, but this kind of thing makes me think of Nazi Germany," she said.

In between distributing the pamphlets, the spokesman talked with a crowd of about 20 students.

When asked why he believed distributing the pamphlets at the University was important for the

student body, he replied, "Would you rather us do it this way or quarantine everyone with AIDS?"

When asked if he believes homosexuals possess rights as U.S. citizens to live as they want, the man replied "No, not when other people are involved, they do not have that right and should not have that right."

He also claimed homosexuals on campus are breaking a constitutional law.

"The U.S. Constitution says that tax dollars will not be used for minorities, but these faggots use tax dollars from student fees that are paying for their expenses. This is against the constitutional law," he said.

David Bowman, co-director of GALA, said, "The facts documented on the leaflet are largely fabrications and almost completely false. The copyright is 1983, and as far as AIDS goes, it is important to update information every six months."

Saqqara Dogs set to perform

The band will play tonight in the EMU Forum Room at 9 p.m. Admission is \$2.50.

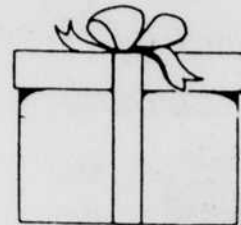
