program that provides a connection between the University and the University of El Salvador. Lachkar is a member of the Sister University Project.

Brooks said student body presidents are not the best representatives of the University to travel to El Salvador as part of the SUP. She suggested finding someone with more knowledge of Central American issues.

Lachkar defended the current administration's choice of ASUO president Steve Nelson as the student representative to El Salvador last fall, because she said Nelson has been a member of the SUP.

Brooks and Lachkar agreed that campus parking and childcare ought to be primary issues for the new student body president.

Candidate Steve Frichette said he and running mate Donna Cooper will push for student-funded, alcohol and drug-abuse education programs at the University.

Frichette and Cooper emphasized their student government experience as their main advantage over the other candidates.

Candidate Phil Levinson said his primary goal would be to "cater to the collective interests of all students at the University."

He and running mate Robert Ball believe the current student government is too narrowly political and unapproachable. They would like to create more student committees.

closing schools," he said.

Kitzhaber said students can get things done. When he was in school, he said the big issue was the Vietnam war. "It was very ugly, but the system did change." He noted the greatest threat in this country is voter apathy.

"We've got to educate and motivate the people and not concentrate on the group of hardcore that are always going to vote no," Kitzhaber said.

Katz also urged the students to educate the people about what the safety net does. She

said the biggest problem is getting people to the polls and noted that the lowest voter turnout was in the 18-21 year old age group.

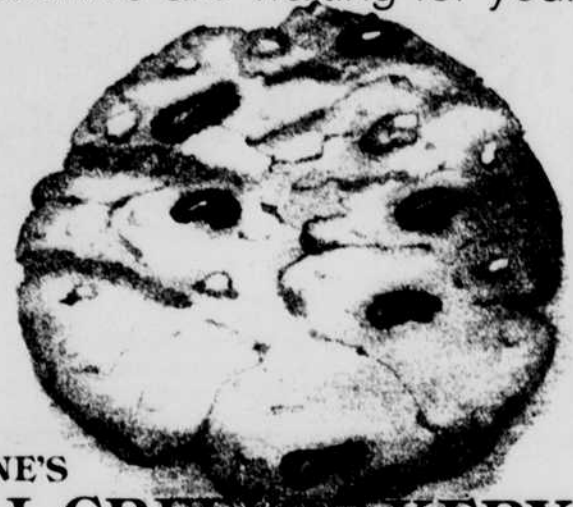
"If the bill goes down, we can say this is unacceptable to Oregon and we can't allow local control to close schools," Katz said when asked what would happen if the safety net bill fails.

She said the state could take control of the situation because the problem would have reached a crisis state.
