

Hoyt promises to preserve ASUO strength

Steve Hoyt sees the ASUO government as one of the strongest student governments in the Western region.



And if elected to the Incidental Fee Committee, he will work to preserve that strength, he said.

"Students have the most power with incidental fees," he said, adding the committee

needs to work well together and be responsible in funding.

Hoyt, a junior English major, has worked as the assistant to ASUO President Steve Nelson since winter term. He also has been involved with the ASUO Child Care Task Force, ASUO state affairs and the on-going wheelchair accessibility project and is active in his fraternity, Phi Gamma Delta.

Hoyt has been endorsed by Students for a Progressive Agenda, as well as the Masters of Business Administration Association. His involvement with SPA did not begin until the elections, but he was drawn to the group by its theme of stu-

dent empowerment, he said.

"Parties give students with similar values and ideas the opportunity to gather together and form a cohesive group," Hoyt said.

He sees the IFC's role in government as an encouraging force in the growth of student programs and believes the committee should be able to work well together in order to do that.

IFC members should foster a cooperative, not confrontational, attitude toward each other and students, he said.

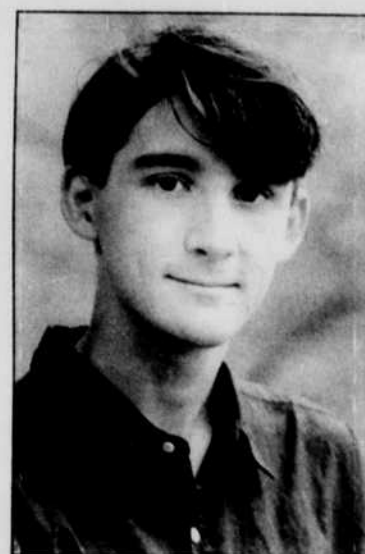
Hoyt describes himself as a hard and dedicated worker who is able to work well with other people. He also would

wholeheartedly support the use of incidental fees to promote substance abuse awareness and education, he said.

"Students need to learn drug awareness, not how to take a (drug) test," he said.

Hoyt would stress equality in IFC funding if elected to a one-year position.

"I think every student has the right to have their incidental fees affect them in a fair and positive way," he said, adding he thought this year's committee was fair in its allocations.

Thompson favors fiscal planning

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When it comes to the Incidental Fee Committee budgeting process, Sandra Thompson believes there is room for improvement.



Thompson, a master's of business administration student in marketing, is seeking a one-year IFC position.

Following her graduation from the University in 1983 with a degree in marketing and management, she worked for Johnson Wax as a sales manager. Most recently she worked as a consultant for the American Red Cross.

While with the Red Cross, Thompson developed, proposed and administered \$4 million budgets. This experience will help her improve the budgeting process, she said.

"It's time for someone with some experience to be on the IFC, and to be honest, an MBA student has the experience to do the job," she said.

"The IFC this year has done a good job. But there is always room for improvement," Thompson said.

Not only would she like to depoliticize the IFC, but she also would like to emphasize better fiscal planning and more fiscal responsibility, she said.

"In the past... a lot of budgets, if they have a 3 percent or less increase, are not closely reviewed and are allowed to just pass through," Thompson said. This leads to the gradual "creeping up" of many budgets, she added.

Thompson sees herself as apolitical and an optimist. And although she hasn't been involved in an elected political capacity, she believes there is more to the job than that, she said.

Thompson is running on the Concerned Students for Responsive Leadership ticket. She sees her involvement with the party as an opportunity to do some positive things, she said.

"(My involvement) gives me a real chance to affect campus issues," she said, and added CSRL allows her freedom to vote and think as she believes —
