

Ducks turn trick again with another sweep over PSU

After sweeping two games from Portland State University last week, the Oregon softball team turned the trick again on Monday as they took two more from the Vikings, 4-0 and 5-3, at Erv Lind Stadium in Portland.

In the first game, Oregon pitcher Sue Voeller held the Vikings scoreless by giving up only two hits and striking out four.

Capi Lynn provided all the offense the Ducks would need by going two for three and scoring Oregon's first two runs.

Kira Lewis scored on a Monica Hull single in the fourth inning, and Paula Barnes scored

on a single by Lewis in the fifth. Lewis picked up where she left off last week by going two for three with one RBI, while Barnes was one for one with a double, a sacrifice and two walks.

Ducks assistant coach John Rittman said the teams hitting as improved over the last month.

"Ever since the Arizona and Arizona State games our hitting has really gotten better," he said.

Oregon coach Teresa Wilson seemed pleased with her team's performance. "We have a lot more confidence now," she said. "We're at our peak right

now. And we're peaking at the right time, with the games we have coming up within the next two weeks."

The Ducks' four-game win streak ups their record to 15-17, with games coming up against nationally-ranked University of California and UCLA.

In game two, both teams were scoreless through six innings.

With one out in the top of the seventh, Lynn singled down the third-base line, and reached second on a sacrifice bunt by Paula Barnes. Voeller was then intentionally walked, and Kira Lewis was hit by a pitch to load the bases for Sony Schroeder, who came through

with a single up the middle to score Lynn.

Oregon catcher Stacy Gustafson came to the plate with the bases still loaded, and drove a ground ball to PSU second baseman Wendy Heckard. Heckard misplayed the ball, allowing Voeller and Lewis to score with the second and third runs of the game.

With Schroeder on third and Gustafson on first, Lynette Privatsky drove a fly ball over Vikings' right fielder Paula Henkel, scoring both Schroeder and Gustafson to give the Ducks a 5-0 cushion.

It turned out that Oregon would need the insurance runs,

as PSU mounted a furious rally in their half of the seventh inning.

The Vikings had the bases loaded at one point with nobody out, and pushed across three runs before the Ducks came up with a game-ending double play.

Privatsky led the way for Oregon in the nightcap by going two for three and driving in two runs with her dramatic seventh-inning double.

Schroeder was the winning pitcher, in addition to going one for three with two RBI's at the plate.



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Women netters beat WSU, fall to Huskies, Idaho State

For Oregon women's tennis coach Sue Jacobsen, last weekend's trip to Pullman, Wash. left her with mixed feelings. The Ducks played some good tennis, but came back with just one win in three matches to show for it.

Things were going along just fine for the Ducks after they leveled host Washington State University, 7-2, on Friday afternoon. But it took a turn for the worse the next day when Oregon lost to the University of Washington, 7-2, and then absorbed a 9-0 shutout at the hands of Idaho State University in an unbelievable match that left the Ducks drained, disheartened, and a little dumbfounded.

Tired clichés aside, this match was much closer than the score indicates. The Ducks were not blown out at any position, and came extremely close to making it a match with some good doubles play. "They were just a little bit better than us at every position," Jacobsen said of the five-and-a-half-hour match. "We knew they were a really good team, but they surprised us a little."

Some individual performances stood out for the Ducks. Kumi Nagamoto, the freshman from Japan, won her number three singles match against Washington, and also teamed with Liz O'Donnell to beat the Huskies at the third doubles position.

Jacobsen was also pleased with the performance of her top doubles team, a spot where the Ducks have not seen a whole lot of consistency. Freshman Kelly Stuart, who also plays number one singles, and sophomore Cindy Grall combined to rip the Cougars 6-1, 6-1. "Sometimes they play very well together," Jacobsen said. "Against Washington State I thought they competed beautifully."
